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

Bees are 'a buzzing', as was congenial conversation of District III members at Sherlock Springs on May 11, site of the District III Spring meeting hosted by Wakulla County Garden Club. The Program speaker, Rob Diaz Villegas, WFSU ecology blogger, spoke on the topic of bees which was timely due to ecological importance of protecting and encouraging our bee population. Sherlock Springs, a large facility with

dining area and large front porch, is located near Wakulla Springs State Park, a beautiful natural setting.

Spring programs held by the seven clubs in the district included a range of topics and activities. Madison Garden Club held a "Natural tablescapes" program. Live Oak Garden Club continues to grow with 64 total members and they celebrate 85 years of affiliation with FFGC and NGC, the Precious Metal "Yellow Diamond" status. Their caladium bulb sale and Spring Bazaar were both successful. They planted over 41,533 trees this past year.

Tallahassee Garden Club held its general membership meeting March 9 with 134 members attending. A highlight of the meeting was the "50+club" where 32 members were each recognized for their 50 years or more of membership in the garden club. Their Spring Extravaganza was held on the grounds of the historic Rutgers House April 23rd. The Extravaganza features circles participation through plant sales, garden art, food, and kid's activities. A 'just for fun' flower show was held inside the Clubhouse. Both Live Oak and Tallahassee Bazaars attract the general public for the unique plant sales and garden art.

Perry Garden Club ended their program year with a covered dish luncheon and a plant to share. The Fall District III Meeting will be hosted by the Perry Garden Club, so planning is underway for the October 13 event, featuring the FFGC officers on their state-wide tour of the twelve districts.

Steinhatchee Garden Club annually sends local children to Camp Wekiva and SEEK and <u>Tallahassee GC</u> is providing scholarship support for a SEEK leadership fellow.

This Spring, District IV commemorated two significant Club achievements:

Garden Club of Middleburg celebrated its 40th year of Federation with FFGC, a 'Gold' year.



On March 25, 2022 the Garden Club of Jacksonville celebrated its 100th anniversary. Jacksonville has centennial anniversary programs with festivities planned for the entire year.

District IV grew by 116 members since September. Special events were held with membership drives. For example, The Garden Club of Orange Park and Middleburg Garden Club held Seed Swaps. Both Clubs gained new members during these events. The Bartram Garden Club has welcomed twenty (20) new members, making the total membership 77, a proud accomplishment for a club only 6 years of age. Alligator Creek held a Spring Meet and Greet in April to help the community learn more about the Garden Club and encouraged individuals to join.

District IV began 2022 with several educational offerings for our members and communities in addition to the Clubs' monthly ongoing programs.

January 25th to 28th, District IV Judges Council sponsored the NGC Flower Show School (FSS) Course 3 at the Ribault Garden Club. The instructors were Penny Decker and Jan Griffin. The FSS Course 4 is scheduled at the Ribault Clubhouse in May with Claudia Bates and Darlene Newell as instructors.

February 23rd and 24th, District IV held NGC Landscape Design School (LDS) Course 1 in Orange Park with over 50 registrants. LDS Course 2 is planned for September 28th and 29th at the Ribault Garden Club. Registration will open this summer.

March 3rd, The Garden Club of Jacksonville partnered with the Duval Audubon Society, Northeast Florida Sierra Club, the Ixia Chapter of the Florida Native Plant Society for a "Grow Your Own Park", with Doug Tallamy of the Homegrown National Park project. This program was offered both in person and zoom.

March 18th, the Garden Club of Orange Park hosted "Color Your Landscape", a horticultural program. The 53 attendees appreciated the four speakers' topics: Turf Grass (Less is Best), Bromeliads in the Garden, Sustainable Roses, and Hybridization of Coleus.



Two flower shows were offered. The Garden Club of St. Augustine in May and Ribault Garden Club's "Bucket List" late April. Ribault's show included a plant sale. Additionally, The Garden Club of St. Augustine announced the return of the Tour of Homes. Mark your calendars for December 4th and tour these six holiday-decorated homes.

Bartram Garden Club's Therapy chairman compiled, published, and delivered 20 interactive nature workbooks to children living in a local shelter for victims of domestic abuse. The workbook, W.O.W. "World of Wonder", included pages to color, dot-to-dot, and word search activities designed to instruct the children about the Florida state flower, bird, and tree, as well as Smokey Bear and Woodsy Owl. The project's objective is to help children achieve emo-



tional balance through the healing powers of nature.

After several years of declining membership and no meetings, The Garden Club of Switzerland held its first meeting in April. One of the club's major undertakings is the Freedom Butterfly Garden at Alpine Groves Park. The Garden Club is partnering with St. Johns County Master Gardener Volunteers to reinvigorate the garden and demonstrate the value of using native plants as wildlife habitat.

Clubs and Circles held fundraisers, plant sales, and 'spring flings'. Callahan and St. Augustine held successful plants sales in March; Green Cove Springs in April; and Middleburg in May. Ribault held a record-breaking Trash to Treasure sale in March. Over 70 attendees paid \$10 for the Preview Party on Friday evening with wine and appetizers served in the (kitchen) Bistro. Excess items were donated to area thrift shops. Jacksonville held their annual flea market in February and in April held their Blooms Galore and More plant sale. The Garden Club of the Lakes sponsored a "Spring Fling" in honor of Earth Day. The garden club sold plants and handed out membership information. Fleming Island held their annual Butterfly Release event in April and the "Art and Garden Party" in May. The Garden Club of Palatka held a March Plant-o-Rama at Ravine State Park, participated in the Bartram Frolics on the Riverfront in April and hosted a May 'Afternoon Tea'. All events were community engagements and opportunities to gain new members.

Last year, District IV planted 354 trees, 68 varieties. The Garden Club of St. Augustine planted the most trees among District IV Clubs. This Director challenged all Clubs to celebrate Arbor Day 2023 with a tree planting and special tree give-away events, partnering with the local Soil and Water Conservation District leaders.

There are four District clubs with Blue Star Marker projects. Jacksonville gained approval to refurbish and move the Marker from Roosevelt Blvd to the Florida Welcome Center. Jacksonville and Bartram are coordinating with the Welcome Center to ensure a smooth move for the marker's new home. St. Augustine's Blue Star Memorial Maker beautification project received permit approval and design planning is progressing for an installation this summer and a ceremony next November. The Garden Club of Middleburg had a dedication ceremony May 21st, Armed Forces Day. This Director and FFGC President, Marge Hendon, were honored to attend.

She also states that currently Creative Corner is offering origami lessons and Nature Strolls, which takes them out to explore different parks and to learn more about nature. They are also presenting speakers addressing ways toward a more sustainable future.



#### FFGC's 100th ANNIVERSARY PLANS!

When you think of a Birthday Party, what comes to mind? Balloons and decorations? We will have them! Party Games? We will have them!! Festive food including ice cream and cake? We will have it!! Party favors? We will have them!! Party dresses? We will give you the opportunity to wear your finest outfits!! All you have to do is accept the invitation being given to each and every one of you! Please join us in 2024!

When we first started talking about the 100th anniversary celebration, we all thought we had plenty of time to raise the funds needed to make this a real party, but then COVID happened and we were unable to meet and tour and generate enthusiasm for the projects planned.

Fundraising is never a favorite thing but with your help, we have managed to raise \$27,127.45 to date.

The state judges' council contributed, as have 2 of the 12 district judges' councils.

To date 16 individual clubs (out of over 150 clubs and circles) have donated. One disbanding club gave all that was left in their treasury!

And 24 generous individuals (out of a membership of over 10,000) have donated. People are donating in memory of others, gifting money to honor others, donating stipend payments, and in other unique ways. So far, 4 districts have contributed to the fund.

From the Advisory Board of former FFGC presidents came the idea of getting the district directors from each administration to donate together as a group to the fund. So, we are reaching out to all the 'Angels', 'Gems', 'Chicks', 'Classy Lassies', etc. for a donation or pledge.

Special thanks to Michelle Maguire, DD from District X, for giving the district directors the idea to contact clubs and circles and asking them to auction something or hold a special fundraiser and donate the proceeds to the fund.

Sadly, it is becoming clear that not everyone shares in the enthusiasm for this special event. Some think it will only take place at the 2024 convention in Jacksonville or at our FFGC headquarters. NOT TRUE!! We are bringing the party to your districts so everyone can participate and celebrate!! We truly hope to involve EVERY member in some way! Please note that much of the money raised will be returned to the districts in the form of birthday party gifts, grants and discounts. The more you give, the more we can give back!!

To date we have spent \$1,867.33 on pins, ornaments and stickers. Many commemorative items will be ordered in the coming months. The 2024 commemorative calendar has been given to The Baker Press in Orlando, bidding \$5,761, to begin assembling an 8  $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 11" wall calendar featuring covers from all 58 Florida Arrangement Calendars since 1953, over 60 FFGC history factoids, important dates for FFGC and the 100th logo on the front cover. Sales of these 2,500 commemorative calendars will begin with the 2023 convention and tour, if not before. Our goal is to sell out! Thanks to Claudia Bates for chairing this project and to Dee Bartcher for gathering the majority of calendar front covers.

The 2024 convention committee is already up and running and promises you a wonderful 100th birthday party! The schedule for the state flower show, "Celebrating 100 Years!", has been written and will be turned over to the state judges' council for finishing touches and final execution. As part of the 2024 convention, we will have our first-ever Members Art Show so get busy creating your best work and you could win a cash prize! Along that same line, we will be creating a commemorative quilt for 2024.

The simple block pattern and instructions will be given out on tour this year! We will also be bringing back Tambola!! You can win 100 somethings!! How fun!

Yes, we are still planning to hold a catered luncheon and a separate dinner at headquarters on 24 April, 2024, our actual birthday. Remember, those who have donated \$1,000 will receive a special invitation to the dinner!

The 100-year history articles for The Florida Gardener are complete and will take the place of the proposed published history book. A suggestion from Kitty Wallace is to provide a compilation of the articles 'on request' to clubs, circles or individuals who might be interested. Also, Sue Roberts has created a 'History' tab on the FFGC website under 'Home' for easy access and reference. Thank you, Sue. We definitely plan to honor the founding clubs (Winter Park, Garden Club of Jacksonville, Halifax Country and Miami) as well as any member born in 1924!!

We hope that all clubs and circles can plant a tree on Florida Arbor Day, 19 January 2024, at 10am so we can get statewide publicity!

And so much more is being planned to recognize this milestone in the history of FFGC and for your enjoyment!

#### PLASTICS POLLUTION

The Ocean Ridge Garden Club and the Town of Ocean Ridge joined together to hold a community event on April 2, 2022 to increase awareness and maybe change a few minds about single-use plastics.

It was two years in the planning due to Covid, but we finally held our "Save the Seas - Plastics Free" event at the Ocean Ridge Town Hall and Oceanfront Park. Everyone had a lovely day with good weather, camaraderie, music, food, and FUN!

People came from the beach, the neighborhoods and drove from other towns to attend the event throughout the day, and all of them cruised the eleven exhibitor booths set up in the shade around the green with music, water and our merchandise booth set up on the patio.

The exhibitors, most of which are non-profit organizations, provided educational materials and loads of information about their mission to preserve the natural environment of the beaches and oceans. We received lots of good feedback from our partner exhibitors - "We had a blast!, and thank you so much for inviting us" said Aaron, Surfrider Foundation.



A feature of the event were the environmental presentations presented by Bryan Galvin, founder of Plastic Symptoms, Inc, and Tom Warnke, founder of the first Surfrider Foundation chapter in Florida and the Surfing Florida Museum in Delray Beach.

Both environmental presentations ("Microplastics!") were well received by the audience.

Many of the attendees participated in a large beach clean-up led by Surfrider Foundation, with Plastic Symptoms and Beach Bucket Foundation adding their equipment to the clean-up.



Afterward, a dozen or more people worked on plants and the critical job of sorting the plastics (lots of balance h really small pieces) into relevant categories for recycling for over 2 hours. Everyone looking on learned something new.

Over 30 garden club members volunteered to work the event through the day serving food, selling merchandise, checking on our exhibitor partners. Everyone learned more about the issues and what we can do, in a spirit of camaraderie, to Save the Seas.

The Town of Ocean Ridge provided police personnel onsite, directing traffic and pedestrians crossing to the beach; keeping the event safe and secure the whole day.

Breakfast and lunch were provided for the exhibitors and volunteers thanks to Pizza Rustica and Bond St. Ale & Coffee. Waste Pro sponsored the event and donated the recycling and sort area. 18

In addition to donations from corporate sponsors, our merchandise booth raised money that contributed to defraying the cost of the event, so that we met all the costs of the event.

After a very successful day, this may have been the first annual "Save the Seas" event..

We have put a stake in the ground and a line in the sand about our point of view on plastics pollution!

#### GARDENING WITH NATURE! - A New NGC Program

Gardening with Nature addresses many concerns shared by garden club members. This initiative is designed for your home garden or gardens your club cares for in the community. We hope to protect our local ecosystems, plants and animals by Planting Smart, Planting More and Planting Natives.

The project is chaired by Horticulture Coordinator, Bud Qualk, and Environmental Concerns Coordinator. Victoria Bergesen. We will have the expertise of two large committees to create content and to address your questions. Our NGC Committee members are here to answer your questions relating to horticulture or environmental issues, to help you plan projects or suggest projects that might be right for your club, your area and your resources.

Gardening with Nature promotes the planting of native plants as the base of the food chain that supports all wildlife including pollinators vital to our agriculture. The native ecosystems in the Western Hemisphere have developed independently for over 80 million years. Microorganisms in the soil, plants and animals evolved together to create a balanced system. The balance has long been disturbed by overdevelopment, pollution, insecticides, and the planting of lawns which require mowing, irrigation and chemical inputs.

#### What Gardeners Can Do:

- Increase planting space by restricting lawn to foot traffic and play areas. Mow at 3-4 inches and do it less often. Taller grass has deeper roots and needs less irrigation.
- \* Remove exotic invasive species as they do not contribute to the native biome and threaten native species. Please note that a native plant may be 'aggressive' and not suitable for the home garden, but only exotic plants may be termed 'invasive'.
- \* Plant keystone genera that support local ecosystems by feeding insects. Native oaks, cherries, willows ,birches, cottonwoods, elms, goldenrods, asters, and perennial sunflowers are often good choices, but find the best species for your garden.

#### GARDEN WITH NATURE! - (cont'd)

What Gardeners Can Do: - (cont'd)

- \* Plant generously in large beds.
- \* Plant in layers: trees, understory trees, shrubs, and perennials.
- \* Protect vertebrate pollinators. More than 1,000 pollinators are vertebrates: birds, bats, and small mammals. Hummingbirds especially need our help as they must daily visit fifteen hundred flowers and eat six hundred to seven hundred insects. Red sugar water is not enough to sustain them!
- \* Plant for insect pollinators. Over 200,000 pollinators are beneficial insects: flies, beetles, wasps, ants, butterflies, moths and bees. We need to support our lepidoptera (butterflies and moths), our 4,000 species of native bees, and these other insect pollinators.
- \* Network with neighbors. Share seeds, seedlings and cuttings. Take photos of pollinators in your garden and share them on social media.
- \* Build conservation hardscapes: cover window wells, use motion detector outdoor lights at night, create bird-friendly baths with bubblers, place small bee hotels around the garden.
- \* Create caterpillar pupation sites under your trees. 90% of caterpillars drop to the ground pupating in the duff or burrowing into the soil. While you will want to clear diseased leaves from under shrubs, a scouredearth fall clean up approach is not insect-friendly.
- \* Avoid insecticide spraying and non-organic fertilizers. Don't treat for disease unless you are certain it is treatable. For example, many gardeners whose shrubs exhibit fungal diseases start spraying with fungicides. These will not work unless they are applied *before* the fungus appears. Ask your local Extension agent for advice.
- \* Participate in your Neighborhood Civic Associations, Tree Commissions etc. Explain the benefits of planting native trees and planting many different species. The loss of millions of ash trees in some states during the last two decades left many neighborhoods without any street trees. We must assume that new exotic invasive insects will continue to challenge us. Planting more species gives us a better chance of not losing everything in the neighborhood at once.

#### Garden Club's Role:

You are not alone! Your garden club, FFGC, and NGC all provide resources to aid you. They can provide programs on native plants, pollinators and related subjects. These may include virtual programs that enable you to hear speakers otherwise too busy or expensive for you to bring in person and may also provide links to articles on websites, social media, and publications. **We are here to help you!**


