Braving the summer heat and wearing masks, shoppers took advantage of the bargain prices on the large


variety of plants and artisan garden related wares. For the novice gardeners, Club members helped with plant selections.

After four years of visits and garden based programs presented at the facility, the pandemic prohibited an in person interaction, so volunteers reached out to the residents with individual cards, notes, photos and drawings each addresses to a Garden Friend at Zon.

Some volunteers included their children and grandchildren, as they created special messages and pictures all about plants, flower, and gardens. Residents who had attended the Garden Club program received their personal messages.

As Pandemic precautions continued, IHB Garden Club volunteers donated 50 plants for Zon's raised wheelchair accessible plants. Volunteers grew the plants from seeds, divided their own assisting plants, or grew new plants from cuttings of flowers, succulents and herbs.

After volunteers left the plants at the door. Zon residents and staff worked together to create new gardens for all to experience the promise of Spring.

Below is an excerpt from the "Thank You" note the Zon Residents sent:

"The cards and notes received touched the hearts of our folks, who had not been able to see their friends or family, many not understanding the quarantine or its purpose. Your messages made them feel love and special, and we thank you for being so considerate of their needs.

Since we have not been able to meet in groups to tend your gardens, your generous donations of plants and flowers were a godsend to give our barren raised beds some much needed color and the look of life again. We have two members of the Zon Garden Club who were able to come to the patio to help, one to decide where to place each plant and the other to play in the dirt with me. I was wearing gloves and had not been able to take pictures of them, but I want you to know that this was the highlight of their month to be able to have something purposeful to do by beautifying their grounds. It may see simplified, but for many of our seniors, they still have the need to feel useful and know that they can still contribute to their world."

New Smyrna Beach G.C. - President, Kathy Healy. NSBGC members have been officially socially-distanced from each other since March, but not quite! Several planted our first Monarch butterfly garden and we had an unofficial competition to see who released the most Monarchs (yours-truly a distant third, but I'm still absolutely thrilled.) Robinswood Garden Club - President, Betsy Talpalar. Robinswood GC will keep their officers for two more years. There was an end of the year get together at Doris' house for members.





In this uncertain time, we will hope for the best, but prepare for the alternative. Stay safe and well, everyone! Warm wishes from Coral Gardens Garden Club.


<u>Marathon Garden Club</u>: Scarlett Duffy, President. So far, we are well at the Garden Club. Our fall plans are as follows:

Biscayne National Park, the largest marine park in the National Park System, protects the longest stretch of mangroves left on Florida's East Coast, the clear, shallow waters of Biscayne Bay, over 50 of the northernmost Florida Keys, the northern end of the world's third-longest reef tract, and evidence of 10,000 years of human history.

When southern Biscayne Bay and the northernmost Florida Keys were threatened with development (a two-pronged threat of a major petrochemical plant and the City of Islandia), Lloyd Miller was at the forefront of the fight to stop both projects. While he would be the first to point out that he didn't do it alone, Lloyd WAS the ringleader and he NEVER gave up. Thankfully, Lloyd and his fellow activists lobbied politicians, wrote letters and spoke before civic groups. Lloyd is the only person alive of the people who went to Washington DC to witness President Lyndon B. Johnson signing the Biscayne National Monument bill.

Lloyd wrote his version of the events surrounding the park's creation in his book Biscayne National Park: It Almost Wasn't. Even just five years ago, Lloyd rose defiantly to speak at a Congressional hearing on changes that would threaten the park.

We and future generations can now enjoy the natural beauty and bounty of Biscayne Bay, the offshore islands and coral reefs thanks to the efforts of Lloyd Miller.

Port Everglades Dredging Project Still Delayed Until 2022

Miami Waterkeeper has undertaken extensive litigation efforts to protect local coral reefs from the Port Everglades dredging project by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. Since filing suit against the Corps under provisions of the Endangered Species Act and National Environmental Policy Act in 2016, Miami Waterkeeper and co-plaintiffs have secured numerous delays to the dredging project to allow for more accurate environmental reviews to occur.

Back in 2015, the Corps conducted a similar dredging project at PortMiami that **illegally buried** an area of reef exceeding 200 football fields in area, **decimating aready-threatened staghorn coral populations**.

The Corps will be submitting another status report on or before September 14, 2020. We'll continue to keep you informed on upcoming decisions, timelines, and environmental reviews.

Wekiva Youth Camp Goes Virtual!!

The painful decision to cancel Wekiva Youth Camp and its special programs for summer 2020 was made on 18 May and the cancellation of LIT came on 29 June. While early-on anticipating holding some version of camp, **contingency plans had been prepared** but we felt that even if we could hold camp, it wouldn't have the same feel and substance as it had for the previous 46 years. Our overnight camp would not adjust well to social distancing in cabins or in the dining hall, cleanliness and sanitation requirements, nor operating at half capacity. Working within the stated restrictions would have been very costly as well.

On 18 May, just one month before camp was to open, we heard from the Wekiwa Springs State Park personnel that the Youth Camp in Apopka would not be opening due to COVID-19 restrictions imposed by the CDC, the state, state park system, etc. We immediately started the process of returning registration fees to camper families and sponsoring garden clubs. A week later, Governor DeSantis made a statement that all summer camp programs would be allowed to open with certain restrictions. At that point, it was impossible to turn around the camp closure processes.

The closure of the Marine Science Station, owned by the Citrus County School Board, in Crystal River, would also remain closed to us this summer. The **safety of our campers, staff and volunteers was our main priority** and seeing how the COVID numbers have continued to spike this summer, we know we made the right decision to cancel camp.

Not wanting to let our campers and their families down, we considered offering some aspects of camp online. Our webmaster, Chas Baker, was up to the task and began creating a framework on the website that would allow us to feature videos, camp activities, and environmental education. Camp Director, John Morand, introduced the virtual camp program idea to our camp families by email and through our Facebook Page. We sent notification to our members on the FFGC Facebook Page and by E-blast.

Our Nature Coordinator, Kathy "Miss Birdie" Rigling, was ever eager to create nature sessions for each week. She created introductory videos (featuring her dog, 'Scout'), lessons and activities for topics on Squirrels, Lizards, Dragonflies, Alligators and other fun animals.

Olivia Morand, who would have been a Circle Leader this summer, coordinated current and former counselors in **singing and recording all the camp songs**, **blessings and closing ceremony songs**. It was great fun to see so many familiar faces and feel their enthusiasm for camp!

Ben Morand, also slated to be a Circle Leader this summer, through is own initiative, re-typed the entire *Wekiva Song Book* to provide lyrics to all the camp songs! Devon Villereal-Dabb and her LIT volunteers are developing a **Virtual LIT** and that program will be available to the selected 28 campers the first week of August.

It was truly a team effort, and in just one month, we were able to pull something fun and meaningful together for not only our campers but anyone who visits our website. We owe a heartfelt *THANKS* to all who participated in this venture!

The first day, 15 June, we had over 1,000 visits to our website from all over the United States, Germany, France, and Vietnam. Each of the six Sundays we experienced similar numbers and were thrilled to have provided this virtual option for our campers. If you haven't taken the time to go to our www.WekivaYouthCamp.org website and check out the virtual project, please do so and let us know what you think. Now that we have this saved on our website, we can use it, improve it and add to it at any time!

I have been growing a variety of vegetable plants in 15 gallon recycled black pots, on top of the ground, in direct contact with the soil for many years. These pots, however, get nematodes after 2 years, requiring me to go through the time, effort, and expense of repotting them in fresh soil. To remedy this, I have now decided that I will try placing them on steppingstones or cover the ground under the pots with plastic.

I like to recycle those black nursery pots, they disappear amongst the other plants, do not show dirt, and I have a great supply of sizes. There are several ways I utilize them in my garden. I have placed small steppingstones around my garden for the colorful plants to sit on and where my sprinkling system can water them. A great idea is to place a large heavy-duty black pot upside down, in the bushes and put a smaller plant on top. This makes it just the right height to be shown off. I have even put a pot over a tree stump for another place to put another plant.

I plant flowers, coleus and caladiums in pots and change them around in my garden throughout the year. White periwinkles with the red eye are still one of my favorites to use because they can last for two years and reseed themselves. I also can make cuttings from them when they need cutting back. Being able to move the pots changes the look in the garden and lets I me try out new plants that I have purchased. I can move them easily if the plants don't like it where they are.

The potted plants are placed in just the right spots where I can enjoy them from my windows in the house and from my garden benches where I sit. Repeating the colorful plants throughout my garden brings it altogether.

FFGC History: OUR FOURTH DECADE: (1955-1964)

Jessie Connor chose as theme "Facing Florida's Future" and brought to it a richness of experience in past endeavors at the local, district, state, region and national levels.

Among highlights of Mrs. Conner's administration were \$15,193 contributed to National Council's "Permanent Home Fund" from Florida members and clubs, participating in the "Buy a Brick" campaign or from special functions profits; having the names of Mrs. John R. Parkinson, Mrs. Eugene A. Smith and Mrs. Vernon L. Conner inscribed in the "Garden of Givers" and that of Mrs. Helen Cutten in the "Golden Book".

Following the emphasis of the previous administration, the report at the 1959 convention listed 77 flower shows, 572 accredited judges and 22 instructors. 85 applications were processed for Teacher Conservation Workshops, 48 attended Blanche Covington Nature Study Courses, attendance at outstanding Short Courses at UF and University of Miami increased each year.

Two beautiful State Flower Shows were held- "Florida rama" at Eustis in 1957, with Kathryn Chester's unique poem of the same name being dedicated to FFGC President Mrs. Conner, and "Florida—The Floral Way" at Pensacola in 1959. Profits from the shows were earmarked for an "Executive Office Fund". A total of 25,524 copies of the 1959 Florida Flower Arrangement Calendar sold brought \$18,819.98 in income revenue.

The 13th H. Harold Hume Fellowship was given. a \$500,000 Scholarship in Landscape Design and the Lucille Turner Junior Garden Club Leader Scholarship of \$50.00 were established. 11 Blue Star Markers were erected, 34 names were added to the FFGC Life Membership roster, 537 applications were made for state awards and 36 for national; Flannelgraph, Bird-o-graph and Litter-grams were produced to assist junior gardeners. "Program Patterns", edited by Mrs. C. R. Mayes, Jr., and the "Florida Garden Club Manual", edited by Mrs. Karl A. Bickel, were published. The Florida Gardener reverted to four issues per year but was increased to 36 pages. Presentation of Silver Traveling Trophies at State Flower Shows became a welcomed innovation. European Garden Tours with Thomas Duffy Travel Agency were begun. sale of Wild Flower napkins was added to money-making projects, and "Certificate of Membership" was given to each FFGC club, listings of private gardens to be visited were published with the cooperation of the Florida Development Commission, Ruth Pettijohn's horticultural displays at conventions were joys to behold and district meetings were made colorful by her "Garden Cart" from which the profits of \$1,009.85 was earmarked toward landscaping the dreamed-of Headquarters, the total number of Bird Sanctuaries in Florida rose to 77 and the total number of garden centers to 100, Dade County Council of Garden Club Presidents raised funds to build and equip a slat house at South Florida Mental Hospital, winning national recognition in garden therapy; a new Plant Distribution List was compiled, FFGC Membership dues were raised to \$1.00, its membership increased to 27,019 plus an additional 860 in probationary clubs and 13,015 junior gardeners.

On April 9, 1959, delegates to our 33rd Annual Convention voted favorably on the motion to accept the recommendation from the BOD that the Federation accept the offer of the City of Winter Park to lease a parcel of land in the southwest corner of Mead Botanical Garden; described as 600 feet along Maitland Ave. and 220 feet deep comprising approximately three acres for a period of 99 years for the sum of \$10.00—such property to be used as the site of a Headquarters Building for the Federation. And, that the board be authorized to proceed with all possible speed to the erection of a State Headquarters building. This recommendation had been prepared for presentation to convention delegates after careful consideration by the BOD meeting at Jacksonville Beach of the recommendations of a Headquarters Investigating Committee composed of Mrs. C. R. Mayes, Jr., Mrs. Melville Hall, Mrs. Earl W. Lau, Mrs. Harry M. Griffin, Miss Mary S. Compton, Mrs. Karl A. Bickel, Mrs. John R. Parkinson and Mrs. Connor. It read:

- Acceptance of approximately 3.03 acres in a beautiful wooded area of Mead Gardens offered by the City of Winter Park for a State Headquarters.
- 2. Earmarking income for the 1959 Florida Flower Arrangement Calendar, the 1959 European Garden Tour, the 1959 State Flower Show as "Executive Office Fund", transferring \$2,500.00 from State Life Membership Fund to "Executive Office Fund" and crediting half the cost of future memberships to this fund, cashing Government Bonds and crediting to "Executive Office Fund" and transferring from General Fund to the "Executive Office Fund" an amount up to \$10,000.
- That opportunities for contributions be provided—these to be listed in the 1959 Spring Edition of The Florida Gardener.
- 4. The secretary at Headquarters to be known as "Office Manager"

These recommendations by the BOD were adopted on February 4, 1959. Mrs. Conner's quote at the 1959 convention was prophetic: "What we have done for ourselves dies with us. What we have done for others and the world, remains and is immortal!"

"Gardening for Tomorrow" proved to be a prophetic theme, as well as one of vision, for the administration of Mrs. C. R. Mayes, Jr. who was installed at the 1959 convention in Jacksonville.

The thought to train Florida's youth in an appreciation of nature and understanding of conservation as one means of implementing the theme expanded from Federation sponsorship of the first Junior Nature Camp, held in Ocala National Forest in cooperation with the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission, to planning first for conservation building in the forest then for the Federation's own Youth Camp which was destined to reach fruition with the opening of "Wekiva Youth Camp" in the summer of 1974. A new Federation project "The Penny Jar for Little People" was started in clubs and circles throughout the state, with proceeds earmarked for a conservation-related building fund.

Groundbreaking for our Headquarters Building in Mead Garden January 6, 1960-less than a year after delegates voted to establish a headquarters-was an auspicious occasion. Mrs. Mayes graciously handed to Mrs. Vernon L. Conner, who envisioned and initiated the project, the gold shovel for turning the first earth. Actual construction began two months later on March 21.

Florida's 30,143 Garden Club members contributed five cents each toward erection of a plastic greenhouse at Raiford State Prison, beamed at beautifying the prison and rehabilitating the inmates many of whom evidenced interest in being trained as nurserymen and ornamental horticulturists against the time they would return to take their place in society and need gainful occupations. (For more info read the 2 October 1987 South Florida SunSentinal paper.) The greenhouse at Raiford Prison-with the Federation's official seal in replica on a marble slab imbedded in a low concrete wall bordering the structure as a permanent tribute to friends who helped-was dedicated May 23, 1960. Shortly thereafter when a CA nurseryman donated \$10,000 worth of orchids to the prison appeals by officials for state funds with which to erect a second greenhouse for this collection received prompt approval-a testimony to the inmates trained by assistance from the FFGC garden therapy program. The five cents per member invested in the greenhouse and lath house at Raiford prison showed ratifying returns when the Better Citizens Club, its membership comprised of 25 inmates, enrolled in the horticulture training program, staged the first flower show at the prison.

Other firsts in the administration included initiation of a series of four accredited land-scape design courses, with Course 1 held in Jacksonville October 5-7, 1959; a 6am bird walk in conjunction with the Short Course at UF, an Advanced Refresher Course offered judges at the Orlando Garden Center, addition of a High School Gardener chairman to the roster and having National Council follow suit with both using "Let's Teach Flora"-a manual for high school gardeners by Mrs. Charles H. Blanchard of Pensacola as the guide for instruction. Mrs. William C. Knox' book on *Botany*, publication of Mrs. Allan Cruickshank's book "Fun with Birds", a "Book Honoring" project which continues to add volumes to the Federation's library at state headquarters, the granting of three-week conservation course scholarships to black teachers desiring to attend FAMU, and the appointment of six Garden Club members to serve on the new-ly created Governor's Committee for Roadside Improvement and Safety.

Extension of the Blue Star Memorial Highway system was noted, with 14 markers added and dedicated. World Gardening advanced in strides and a shipment of dried materials made into corsages, epergnes, trays, baskets and plaques, along with treated leaves of many varieties, were sent to Singapore Garden Society for distribution in Malaya.

The Federation was hostess group for the South Atlantic Region convention at Boca Raton just two months prior to the state convention at the Palm Beach Biltmore Hotel, the business agenda for which included delegates approving proposed revisions of the FFGC Charter and Bylaws changing our tax exempt status with the IRS from 501 c 4 to 501 c 3 permitting a more liberal interpretation of this status.

Mrs. Mayes accepted three awards for Florida at the 1960 National Council Convention in Houston, TX. Attendance at both the Short Course at UF and Tropical Short Course at University of Miami increased. Twenty teachers attended the Conservation Workshop for Teachers at FSU and four of the five Federation scholarships offered at FAMU were granted. More than 200 girls enrolled at Lake Eaton Conservation Camp in the Ocala National Forest with the Sears Foundation contributing a 'campership" for each of the Federation's 12 districts.

Thirty-eight women who worked with various youth organizations attended Blanche Covington Nature Study Course at Hugh Taylor Birch State Park and conservation courses in each of the 12 districts attracted a total of 708 new members. Fourteen bird sanctuaries were established during the administration, bringing our total to 96.

FFGC History: OUR FOURTH DECADE: (1955-1964) - (cont'd)

The first historic marker erected by the Federation in cooperation with the Florida Board of Parks and Memorials under a program authorized by the 1959 Legislature was dedicated at Chattahoochee October 27, 1960. The cast aluminum marker, painted deep green with gold lettering, has the State of Florida seal at the top. It marks the authentic location of the old U. S. Arsenal built in 1832. (For more info: FLheritage.com: UNITED STATES ARSENAL (1832-1861))

Governor LeRoy Collins' proclamation designating a special "Don't Be a Litterbug-Keep Florida Clean Day" at the Federation's behest was published in 82 newspapers statewide. The 8th State Flower Show, "This is Our Life", was held December 1-3, 1960, in Sanford attracted hundreds of exhibitors and visitors. Flower Show Schools gained in popularity and the Federation's 'Plant Distribution Project Cold Tolerance Report" by Nancy E. Knox and J. J. McSwiney, co-chairmen, was published.

Truly a highlight of the administration was the dedication of State Headquarters Building on February 2, 1961-not quite a year and one month after the Groundbreaking Ceremony-by Mrs. Charles H. Nettleton, first vice president of National Council of State Garden Clubs, "to the useful purpose of the Florida Federation of Garden Clubs in its services to the State of Florida and to its contributions to the beauty of our nation". A surprise feature was the presentation of an oil portrait of Mrs. Connor, gift of her Lakes and Hills Garden Club of Mount Dora, to be hung in recognition of her untiring efforts in promoting the Headquarters program.

Grand finale of the administration was the 35th annual FFGC Convention held in St. Petersburg Aril 12-14, 1961, which had as theme "Beatitudes of Beauty", At its conclusion Mrs. Jack W. Dunlap, as president, headed the corps of officers installed by former president, Mrs. John R. Parkinson. As a Life Member of the Garden Club of Jacksonville, FFGC and National Council of State Garden Clubs, Hazel Dunlap of Orange Park came especially well equipped to be the Florida Federation President in 1961. Beautification and Conservation were to be emphasized to and by FFGCs more than 30,000 members during the two-year administration for which the chosen theme was "Florida's Beauty—Our Heritage and our Responsibility".

"In A Garden", written by Mrs. J. Park Stewart of Orlando, was adopted as the Federation's official song (This can be found on our FFGC.org website) and "Lament for the Litterbug", by Isabel Taylor Hayes of Tampa Federation was adopted as its official "litterbug" song.

The Florida Gardener, in celebrating its 10th year of service to the Federation and its members, blossomed forth in full color on its covers and won the National Council State Publication Award. Four Foreign Tours carried their full quota of members on thrilling travels and earned profits for FFGC projects, a \$15,000 gift from Mrs. Josephine Bay Paul provided for the first "Gateway" planting, five Blue Star Memorial Highway Markers were erected and dedicated with the new Blue Star Marker cover made and donated by Mrs. Earl Lau of Winter Park used at each.

A greenhouse was donated to the Avon Park Correctional Institute through the Federation's Garden Therapy program, 51 Memorial Trees were planted in "Memory Woodland" at our Headquarters and 82 Life Memberships were added to the state roster. The Botany Handbook for Florida was printed by the State Department of Agriculture, an Historic Marker was placed in Koreshan State Park at Estero (For more info: FLheritage.com: "IN THE NAME OF HUMANITY" – Koresh), and November 29, 1962 was designated as "Don't Be a Litterbug Day" in Florida in a proclamation by Governor Farris Bryant. December 4, 1962, was designated as the first World Gardening Day in Florida by proclamation of Governor Bryant and contributions from clubs and circles provided grants of \$50 each to 47 teachers at Teacher conservation Workshops at FSU and to nine at Economics and Resource Use Workshops at FAMU.

A three-color porcelain enamel on steel official emblem bearing a replica of the FFGC seal was approved and made available for use on Civic Directories by individual clubs in improving the appearance of entrances to their towns and cities. The 6th and 7th Tropical Short Courses at University of Miami were well attended and widely acclaimed. Two Garden Club short courses at UF presented the 17th, "Beauty is Forever", to 193 members and the 18th "Magic for House and Garden" to 298; and the Federation's library was moved from UF to its permanent home at State Headquarters, Winter Park.

"Dynamic Beauty", the National Award-winning State Flower Show, made an enchanting prelude to the 36th Annual FFGC Convention which had as theme "Enchanted Heritage" and was held in Jacksonville April 2-3, 1962. It was at this convention Mrs. Dunlap and the Federation were cited for cooperation in the Girl Scout Projects during

their Golden Anniversary Year. The Florida Society of Flower Show School Instructors was organized and other firsts including publishing 'Here's How To", and "Corsage Study Course" under FFGC auspices.

At the National Council of State Garden Clubs 1963 Convention in Atlanta, GA, Florida's Kitty Parkinson of Daytona Beach was elected recording secretary and four other FFGC members including Mrs. L. M. Atkinson, Mrs. C. H. Blanchard, Mrs. Vernon Conner and Mrs. C. R. Mayes were appointed to the National Board. Florida won nine National Awards and a Florida board member gave orchids she grew for decorations at the awards banquet.

Curtain ringer-down on a very successful, progressive and harmonious administration was the Federation's 37th Annual convention which had as theme "Challenging Destiny" and for which 965 enthusiastic members surged into Miami Beach April 29-30, 1963. "Gardening Together" was the theme chosen by Miami's Louise Hewlett who accepted the gavel April 30, 1963. Togetherness was evident in the friendly cooperation of nine committees who pushed "TREES" to the forefront of the many achievements of this term. To the urging of "Let's plant a tree in '63-Let's plant more in '64-Then keep our project still alive and reach our goal in '65", an incredible 1,384,294 quality trees were planted. More than 400 members shared together the joys of two Tropical Short Courses set up on a one-day study, one-day fun basis, at University of Miami. Seventy Youth leaders shared ideas and interests at two sessions of Blanche Covington Nature Study course. Continuing its strong interest in "the gardeners of tomorrow", the FFGC board voted \$500 from the general fund for the Junior Nature Camp Building Fund. Three years of earnest endeavor and united sharing by Junior Gardeners throughout the state were rewarded when a commemorative bronze plaque marked completion of their project-restoration of "The Arrivas Grove" in Old St. Augustine. Dedication ceremonies were held at The Grove January 16, 1965, celebrating Arbor Day during that city's 400th Anniversary observance.

Attendance of 5,553 adults and 158 children attested to the popularity of the 10th State Flower Show, "Florida-Our Land and People", held in Coral Gables. The Federation's share of the proceeds was \$2,254.93. A "Guardian of Gardening "category was created and Mrs. Robert A. Mooney, Miami, became the first contributor to the fund. At Mrs. Hewett's suggestion, \$1,500 was taken from general funds to inscribe "1963-1965 Executive Board" on the special "Guardians of Gardening" Wall at State Head-quarters.

There wasn't anything "Down to Earth" about the 38th Annual FFGC Convention held May 12-13, 1964, at Hollywood Beach Hotel. It was here The Florida Council of Flower Show School Instructors and The Landscape Critics Council were organized.

Flower Show Schools were held throughout the state, bringing the Judge's Council roster to 589. Continued Landscape Design Courses brought the total number of Landscape Design Critics to 60. Demands for Florida's *Flower Arrangement Calendar* could not be met-25,173 copies were sold in 1964 and 26,041 in 1965 with the profits for the latter year reaching an unprecedented \$9,647.23. Blue Star Memorial Highway Markers were erected to boost the Federation's total to 47 along 1,837 miles of Florida's approved highways. Two National and 29 State Life Members were added and inviting membership drives pushed FFGCs roster to 30,611. A total of 434 members were made aware of the many benefits derived from gardening at the 19th and 20th Garden Club Short Courses, with the respective themes "Gold at your Fingertips" and "Gardening Together", at UF.

Participation in World Gardening's "people-to-people' program resulted in thousands of packages of seeds, gardening books and magazines being sent to South American and other countries. \$2,300 was contributed to CARE, Inc., and American Korean Foundation. An additional \$2,200 was spent for seeds. Florida's contribution to the program won National recognition. Fun-filled foreign tours were enjoyed including a mid-winter tour of Mexico, a Caribbean cruise, a special trip to Greece, the popular 21 -day European tour, a 47-day "Grand Tour of Europe" and an around the world trip of 56 exciting days. Profits of \$3,430.50 were added to FFGC Endowment funds.

A total of 1,016 members gathered for the Federation's 39th Annual convention "Charting Our Course Together" held April 28-29, 1965 in Tampa. All were agreeably surprised and thrilled to see FFGC's own banner standing alongside "Old Glory" and the Florida State Flag. The Federation Flag was a gift by North Tampa Garden Club, the hostess group. Enthusiasm was so contagious that during the Garden Therapy breakfast donations of \$98 each were given to Avon Park, Apalachee and Raiford. These were increased by a \$400 collection from the assembly.

Taking part in the planting were a small group of members from the Greenacres C.A.R.E.S. Junior Garden Club, an after-school program of second through fifth graders, supported by the Oleander Garden Club of the Palm Beaches. National Garden Week is an annual event for the Oleander Garden Club that acknowledges the importance of gardening and the numerous contributions of gardeners, from providing beauty, balanced ecology, community building, youth support and education. In celebration of National Garden Week, Greenacres C.A.R.E.S Junior Garden Club members created miniature dish gardens for the City of Greenacres' officials as a thank you for all of their support





Barbara Hadsell and Beverly Lichtenstein of Oleander Garden Club presented Mayor Flores of Greenacres with the Proclamation of National Garden Week.

Barbara Hadsell, National Garden Clubs and FFGC Gardening School Chair, coordinated the celebration, introducing Beverly Lichtenstein, President of Oleander Garden Club. According to Lichtenstein, National Garden Week gives us the opportunity to encourage pride in our communities, work with our cities, and especially our youth.

Hadsell, Lichtenstein, and members unable to attend, gave special thanks to Greenacres City for the two 15-foot Southern Live Oak trees. Southern Live Oaks are majestic trees that are emblems of the South. Crowns of the largest Southern Live Oaks reach diameters of 150 feet (45.7 meters)—nearly large enough to encom-

pass half of a football field. On average, the crown spread is 80 feet and the height is 50 feet. Branches usually stem from a single trunk, which can grow to five or six feet in diameter. These nearly evergreen trees have a deep tap root system that makes them resistant to strong winds. According to Doug Tallamy, Professor of Entomology, University of Delaware, oaks support more life than most other tree species, up to 500 different species of organisms.



In the coming years, these majestic, matured trees will welcome visitors to Freedom Park. Some of the children from the Greenacres after-school program C.A.R.E.S. had special shovels to help with the planting of the trees. It will be these children and others that will see these trees grown and provide a more beautiful tomorrow.

Energizing Youth with Educational Activities during the Pandemic

With all of the turmoil we've been living with for the past several months area Garden Clubs have been working to keep youth engaged through environmental restoration and education.

Lauderdale-by-the-Sea. On a recent morning at a Lauderdale-by-the-Sea beach, a handful of volunteers, both young and young at heart, gathered to weed out invasive scaevola sprouts and plant native sea oats. Sea oats occur throughout the coastal Southeast on dunes and beaches, preventing erosion and actually building dunes by helping to accumulate sand. Sand is trapped by the long leaves of sea oats, upward growth is stimulated, and rooting occurs, thus, mitigating erosion and building more and bigger dunes. This plant is extremely drought- and salt-tolerant, making it a key planting for dune restoration.

Lauderdale-by-the-Sea Garden Club members teamed up with the Youth Environmental Alliance (YEA), a nonprofit environmental education organization founded in Davie, Florida in 2005.

The mixed team of youth and adults worked for two hours to restore the dunes in the hot sun. Outdoor restoration projects can't be moved online yet they are still happening, just in small groups of 10 for social distancing. YEA and Lauderdale-by-the-Sea Garden Club use projects like this as an opportunity to teach science in this period of educational uncertainty.

Stuart. The Garden Club of Stuart has been working with the Boys and Girls Club of



Palm City, preparing for the fall planting with four, raised herb and vegetable beds. Weeds were removed and the beds covered with tarps to eliminate weeds and some pests. The two native and wildflower beds are flourishing and provide habitat for butterflies and nectarseeking wildlife. Four trestle tables have been painted and provide an excellent outdoor learning center. The students are excited to learn about plants and enjoy harvesting and taking home what they have grown. Many have never had the experience of gardening and

come ready to work in the garden. One fun project was all about worms. Many of the children had never been up close to a worm and, before the lesson was over, had adopted a worm before putting it in the garden. Lots of fun and screams. *Cyndy Trossbach, Youth Chairman, District X, Youth Chairman, Garden Club of Stuart*

Valparaiso. The Valparaiso Garden Club is working with 25 junior garden club members ages K-7th grade in three different groups to accommodate social distancing and safety protocols. Future work is planned in the garden as well as some field trips.

The Palm Beaches. Oleander Garden Club of the Palm Beaches (OGC) has been working with Greenacres C.A.R.E.S. Jr. Garden Club members to promote environmental education and awareness.

Energizing Youth with Educational Activities during the Pandemic—(cont'd)

Starting in early April, a few members of OGC worked at Greenacres Community Center organizing the Jr. Gardeners' notebooks that the students had been working on weekly since October. Via USPS the students received their notebooks with additional activities from the Florida Coastal Office and an educational coloring and activity book from South Florida Water Management District entitled, "Saving Energy and Water." The Jr. Gardeners also received their botanical arts projects they had been working on in February and activities for at-home projects.





At the end of April, with the help of Greenacres Community Center employees who coordinated a curbside pick-up with the parents of the Jr. Garden Club members, a few OGC members put together more educational activities all revolving around butterflies. They

also picked up five milkweed plants for each student with instructions on how to care for their plants as well as what to expect when caterpillars appeared. The OGC members and employees of Greenacres Community Center delivered the plants and packets to the cars. Many of the Jr. Garden Club members were in the cars and it was exciting for the children as well as the adults to see each other!



In early June six dish gardens, made by the Jr. Garden Club members, were delivered to Greenacres City Hall as a "thank you." 

How Can You Help Grow A Forest?

One way is to help establish a "Penny Pines Plantation" in a National Forest.

The plantations are a part of the regular National Forest reforestation program planted on burned-over and brush covered areas which are potentially productive timberlands. Planting sites are selected by the Supervisor of each National Forest. These plantations provide soil protection, watershed protection, soil stabilization, future harvestable timber, as well as beauty and shade for recreation.

Your Garden Club can participate in a meaningful and practical conservation project by contributing \$68.00 to a Penny Pines plantation as part of the costs of replanting replacement and/or trees indigenous (not just pine trees) to a particular damaged area, whether by fire or by other natural catastrophe.

We have 3 National Forests in the State of Florida: Ocala National Forest, Osceola National Forest, and Apalachicola National Forest. All our contributions are earmarked to go to these forests. We need to promote education in conservation by creating public awareness of the need to protect and manage our National Forest resources.

CONGRATULATIONS FLORIDA GARDEN CLUBS! You contributed \$21,692 from the period March 2019 to April 2020.

FFGC contributed the most donations from the Deep South Region, which includes Alabama, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi and Tennessee. I was absolutely thrilled when I got the news.

I'm hoping we contributed the most in NGC, but I haven't heard anything yet.



Coral Springs Community Garden and Food Forest

In 2009, the City approached the Rotary Club of Coral Springs to help begin a Community Garden. Members of Coral Springs Garden Club would also assist. A number of residents became involved in the project and took over the running and organization of the Garden. Individuals rent a plot and grow vegetables of their choice.

In 2014, one of the gardeners and organizers, *Judi Gulko*, had a vision to develop the lot adjacent to the garden into a Food Forest. A Food Forest grows trees and other perennial plants in an ecologically sustainable way which improves the environment. Utilizing permaculture design, it is developed by mimicking nature and placing companion plants together as in a forest. The mission of the Food Forest is to grow and teach about tropical plants that are found abundantly here in South Florida and provide a healthy ecosystem for humans and pollinators.

In keeping with the philosophy of the Food Forest, Judi has incorporated the system of the seven F's. The seven F's are fun, fiber, fuel, fertilizer, food, fodder, f(ph) armaceutical (meaning herbs with medicinal properties). All waste is composted.

The Forest incorporates seven layers. Trees, such as Ackee and Soursop, are the tallest. Root vegetables like casaba and sweet potatoes are the lowest, being underground. Mimosa pudica is a ground cover and various heights of shrubbery lie in between. Some plants, such as marigolds, are planted for their insect repellent properties.

After the tragic shooting at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School, the Helena Ramsay Memorial Garden was created, incorporating bamboo plantings to honor each victim and a Meditation Labyrinth, a symbol of the journey of life.

Volunteers help maintain the property and can enjoy the fruits of their labors. Guests are welcome, but are asked to respect the Forest and not help themselves. For further information, contact Lynn Rochelle at: b1sk1e@aol.com.

Virtual Resources, Tools Now and Forward

So along came the MONTH of MARCH. The words CANCELLED were rubber stamped across all of our calendars. Shocked, scared, anxious, sums up most of the garden club's leadership and member's reactions.

What happened next, I liken to wildflowers popping up in places you never imagined.

Public Institutions like museums and Public Gardens from coast to coast took a quick assessment of their situation. They not only strategized a plan to keep their plants alive with limited staffing, but within a short period creativity exploded with offerings to both educate and entertain online. You can find endless programs being offered on nonprofit sites, deep into the 2021, winter months.

By March, I knew I had to pivot for STATE and District Meetings were scheduled. I immediately went about finding online resources and began making lists to share with my Club Presidents, District Directors and even my Region.

Next came my ask to all the NGC STATE Presidents seeking their recommendations for 5 programs or tours they would endorse as good ones. After all, THERE ARE NO MORE BOUNDARIES. No travel or accommodation fees. That is still a work in progress for not everyone believed that this would last, well they guessed wrong, sadly.

So, what is involved with a presenter. You negotiate a price for a ZOOM or Live Stream session. Live Stream is good for you have no restrictions like ZOOM usually capped at 100 attendees for most accounts (yes you can pay more to bump out the numbers). My recommendation is 45 minutes of material, including Q & A. Too much time online creates fatigue and we all recognize that by now. To me, a PowerPoint via a SHARED SCREEN is the same content you would see in person, but perhaps online you pay more attention. Consider the opportunity to add presenters who come far away. I'm hoping that our NGC South American affiliates will bring their horticulture to us during the next six-to nine months. I'm volunteering to do a US Botanical Garden or the US National Arboretum (our official address) tour for you, just let me know. Have a camera? You can do live or video anywhere with green interest and I can include a Q & A with the head of the gardens to share with everyone and support these efforts.

Most of you have found out that your regular club presenters have adapted and are willing Zoom presenters. Even tap your own members as presenters. We all have smartphones, so how about creating a video and playback for a ZOOM meeting of one of your own outings or, you can upload it to a YOUTUBE channel and it can be private linked or available to the public. Many garden clubs and even NGC STATES have channels now on YOUTUBE. Note some of the green celebs have presentation material online, paid for by other nonprofits. You can play them for free online. So instead of paying \$250-\$1,000 for the presenter, you can negotiate a \$75-\$200 fee to come at the end for a Q&A. Or capture questions to be answered via email and you then share. The variations of adapting the HOW with WHOM...use your imagination!

You will find many of the STATE Master Gardeners and Naturalists, Audubon Society, National Wildlife, National Geographic, Sierra Club, Nature Conservancy and similar organizations are all sharing programs with the public that are available. Remember they are all "parked" at an internet address and all you need is your host on ZOOM to connect to the material and SCREEN SHARE! Most of the material is FREE or, a small donation fee. Or simply offer a list of recommendations of programs for members to explore on their own.

There is simply so much available, that is now getting hard to narrow down choices for the upcoming program year. We at NCAGC are doing pop-up sessions as rewards for our clubs which we will host probably once a month. We have movies and special speakers. We send out the date and time and hopefully, many will take advantage of it. In some cases, we will repeat the program by popular demand.

So, some of my favorites:

Who has been to the New York Botanical Garden? Their long-planned spring exhibit was cancelled but they adapted beautifully. Select any of the Jeff Leatham's Kaleidoscope Virtual Tours and enjoy!

The Smithsonian has done at least 10 programs on their 'Let's Talk Gardening' series, available to all, free. As well as the US Botanical Gardens. Check out your favorite public gardens to see what they are offering.

AND NOTE THAT THE Chelsea Flower Show, the Virtual version, IS still available online.

The benefit of virtual resources will enrich what we can offer going forward even when we return to meeting in person. Clubs who don't have big program budgets, this is a win. With a laptop, WIFI in the location and a screen, you can project a ZOOM session with a special presenter or, simply enjoy a movie (launched from a URL), even a tour or similar. NOTE we have found speakers, who don't have to travel are price negotiable.

I am now the Central Atlantic Region Virtual Resource Chair. Yes, I am lobbying NGC powers, to create a new COMMITTEE that will pool online, speaker, resources for a HUB for everyone to share.

History of FFGC Tri-Council

On January 10, 2008, six members of the Florida Federation of Garden Clubs, Inc. met at the home of *Pat Carver* at Dade City. Present were *Carolyn Schaag*, Past President of FFGC and President of Gardening Consultants' Council; *Darcy Stottlemyer*, President of Landscape Design Consultants' Council; *Pat Carver*, President of Environmental Consultants' Council; *Joan Pryor*, Past President of FFGC; *Sue Angle*, 3rd Vice President of FFGC; and *Jayne Hemstreet*, State Schools Chairman.



The goal of the meeting was to bring the three Consultants' Councils together for the purpose of sharing meeting time before FFGC Board Meetings three times a year, publishing a joint yearbook, promotion of education, publishing a joint newsletter, sharing common projects, and building stronger organizations.

The decision was made the group would be named "Tri-Council" and would be led by a "Tri-Council" President. The President would serve a two-year term, concurrent with the FFGC President, and each President would appoint the Tri-Council officers.

The first joint meeting was held on January 16, 2008, with *Carolyn Schaag* presiding. The recommendation was presented and approved and the "Tri-Council" became a reality.

On September 10, 2014 members adopted bylaws naming the "Tri-Council of FFGC". The three Consultants' Councils adopted new Bylaws at this same meeting which eliminated a secretary, a treasurer, and a separate bank account for each of the Councils and established a "Tri-Council" secretary, treasurer, and one bank account that would serve the organization starting with the 2015-2017 administration.

On September 14, 2014, the "Tri-Council of FFGC" adopted Standing Rules creating the FFGC Tri-Consultant and FFGC Master Tri-Consultant status to recognize those who have completed all three schools and are NGC Consultants in Good Standing.

The first award certificates and pins were presented on April 19, 2015 at the FFGC Convention in Boca Raton, Florida. Florida is the only state to date that has this recognition for NGC consultants. For more information, visit the administrative page:
