

Garden Club Tune-Up and Repair:

A Tool Kit for Struggling Clubs

Congratulations to the winners of the recent President's Project #70, Two-Year Membership Incentive awards! Your recruitment methods were so successful, we thought it would be a good idea to **SHARE** those with all clubs and circles in our growing organization.

Green Thumb Garden Club, District I: In September 2017, Green Thumb Garden Club started with 122 members, and now has 147 members. The Green Thumb Garden Club is an extremely busy club with 26 standing committees involved in local and nationwide organizations. They contribute to many associations such as Jr. Gardeners, Boys and Girls Clubs, Habitat for Humanity, the South Walton Turtle Association, South Walton Artificial Reef Association, and contribute to disaster relief, Sharing and Caring, and youth camps to name just a few. Members are ambassadors! They encourage their friends to join by inviting them to meetings and telling them about the club. They held a floral design series and opened up to other clubs. They publicize their events. They welcome all guests and new members by recognizing them at meetings and urging them to become members and become involved. They are in constant contact with members via email and group activities and their Facebook page is constantly being updated. The Membership Chairman is diligent in sending new members information.

All they do has contributed to their standing in their small community and larger area as their reputation has spread, and they are looking forward to our becoming a 50I(C)(3) in the near future. They feel this will lend more stature to their organization as a credible and viable community-minded organization.

Port St. Joe Garden Club, District II: The Port St. Joe Garden Club will be celebrating 70 years of gardening on the Gulf coast and has earned a 321% membership increase over the past two years! The 2017-2018 year began with a membership of only 19. The 2018-2019 year began with a membership of 35 and currently their roster reflects a membership of 80. The success of membership growth and retention in this club can be attributed to several things: Community Visibility; Their Facebook page gets the most hits of any page in Gulf county according to the local Chamber of Commerce. The Star, the weekly newspaper, features club news in over 70% of its issues. The town boasts two Blue Star Memorial Markers. The club gives a \$1000 scholarship to a deserving high school student. They hold their annual Flower Show during National Garden Club Week. Dynamic monthly programs at the garden center are very diversified, interesting and educational. Average member attendance rate is 75%. Annual fundraising projects and mid-August "Meet and Greet" are very successful as well. **Communication** is also a key component of their growth and retention. *E-Vites* are sent out as a monthly reminder of upcoming meetings. The ListServe is kept up to date and includes names and emails of everyone that has ever signed in at one of the club hosted events. Their Membership Application asks potential members to list special interests and hobbies which help decide monthly meeting topics, field trips and hands-on workshops. Dedicated, new, hard-working members have added a new perspective to an old club. Community involvement provides members with various participation possibilities: a float in the Christmas Parade (Hoe, Hoe, Hoe!), re-landscaping a senior citizen and community center. The Port St. Joe Garden Club offers something for everyone! They realized that garden club isn't just for gardeners! This garden club has been able to supply the camaraderie. education and community involvement that retirees and new residents are seeking. Plans to develop more special interest groups to allow members more interaction to build friendships and aid in member retention will be a part of their future activities.

Gardeners Out East, District VIII: Gardeners Out East increased membership by 96%, growing the club from 24 members in summer 2017 to 47 members in spring

2019. The effort to attract new members and retain current members permeates all the club's activities. Lakewood Ranch is a fast-growing community where many new residents are also new to Florida. In terms of membership, their objective is to help build a sense of community within the club and across the many neighborhoods that make up Lakewood Ranch. They also strive to help members feel at home in the county and state. They offer their members a chance to make and deepen friendships; to learn about gardening, floral design and Florida's environmental issues at meetings and on field trips, and to give back to the community through service projects and charitable giving. They have two ongoing service projects in Lakewood Ranch: a Florida-Friendly butterfly garden in Summerfield Park and a Blue Star Memorial Marker at Town Hall. The garden is supported by twice-monthly work days and the Blue Star Memorial is decorated with a wreath and American flags six times a year on days that honor veterans. They promote their club through word of mouth, their website, Facebook and publicity in the media. They encourage members to bring guests to their programs, field trips and especially to the two major social events, the holiday luncheon in December and the season finale in May. Members and guests enjoy the interesting and relevant activities, so they talk about them to old and new friends in their neighborhoods and invite them to participate.

Activities to attract and retain members are coordinated by the program committee, membership committee, community service project committee, Florida Friendly butterfly garden chair, publicity chair, website chair, Facebook committee and the

five officers. They encourage members to participate in activities that are sponsored by other District VIII clubs. Within a week of a new member's paying their dues, the president emails a welcome note with a "Frequently Asked Questions" document attached. This five-page FAQ is posted on the club's website and provides information about the club, its website, officers and volunteer opportunities as well as basic information about FFGC and NGC. At a new member's first club meeting, the president presents the new member her name badge and the membership committee chair then welcomes the member to introduce

herself to the club. At club events, officers and committee chairs make it a point to chat with new members, introduce them to other members and make them feel welcomed and valued. They make it a point to recognize and thank all members who help make the club function. Virtually everything the club does is intended to retain members or attract new members. They set up carpools on road trips so the newcomers travel with experienced members. They invite new members to help set the future direction of the club. They survey members every May for feedback on their likes and dislikes of the past club year and for suggestions about programs, and community service projects. Every June the club's Board members and committee chairs review the past year's successes and failures and work on a strategy to retain and recruit members in the coming year.

<u>Tallahassee Garden Club, District III:</u> The objective was not only to increase membership, but also to retain current members. Each of the 627 Tallahassee Garden Club members was encouraged to invite friends to join. They partnered with other community organizations such as Goodwood Garden and Museum, McClay State Park, the Women's club, local schools, senior centers and Tim Tebow Foundation. They made sure that for every project they undertook, Tallahassee Garden Clubs' name was publicized. Members were encouraged to have a buddy system, such as have one current member assigned to a new member and greet them at each meeting, offer rides to events and follow-up on absences and make sure they felt comfortable and welcome.

We hope this Membership Incentive Award recap has been helpful and you have discovered some new ideas for recruiting and retaining your garden club members!

2019 GREEN SCHOOLS RECOGNITION PROGRAM

Florida Atlantic University's Pine Jog Environmental Education Center's Green Since its inception, the program has grown and now includes 129 Palm Beach Schools Recognition Program has been in existence for the past eleven years. The program's initiative encourages schools by recognizing their efforts toward "going green" and promoting cultures of sustainability which save money, increase employee retention and create an overall sense of well-being on their school campuses and in their communities. The program recognizes public and private schools in Palm Beach and Martin counties that are making strides in the enhancement of school grounds, school sustainability, integrating a 'green' culture in the curriculum, encouraging community involvement, and providing ongoing administrative support.

The School Districts of Palm Beach and Martin counties as well as the individual sponsors listed under Judges Choice Awards combine to help reward successful school programs. The donors of the Judges Choice Awards which include city, county governments and local businesses also include The Florida Federation of Garden Clubs, District X, and individual garden clubs within the District; namely, The Garden Club of Stuart, Oleander Garden Club of the Palm Beaches. and the West Palm Beach Garden Club. Over \$13,000 in cash prizes are awarded annually to the top Green Schools and are recognized at the annual Green Schools Award ceremony held at Florida Atlantic University's campus in Boca Raton. This year, the welcome and opening remarks were presented by Ray Coleman, Executive Director of FAU Pine Jog Environmental Education Center, Anne Henderson, Director of Education, and Lauren Butcher, Green Schools Recognition Program Coordinator. Jim Sachett, retired broadcast journalist, was the master of ceremonies. Green School participants are also eligible to win the Green Student, Green Teacher and Green Principal of the Year awards, each receiving a check in the amount of \$500. New this year were two awards for Green Facilities Staff and Green Food Service Staff.

Schools who participate in the Green Schools Recognition Program submit a

summary of their activities that meet the requirements of the program. Then, in February, the Pine Jog Environmental Center holds a workshop to train the volunteers who participate in the program as judges. Everything is done electronically. Each judge three receives two or applications and each application is judged by at least three judges. Judges School Grounds Enhancement, and Well-Being, Curriculum Integration, Community

Involvement and School Wide Culture. The program coordinator then compiles the data and based on the compilation of the three judges scores, categorizes schools by: Schools of Excellence, Schools of Quality or Schools of Promise. The top three Schools of Excellence are awarded monetary prizes: The school with highest points is awarded \$2,000, and second place is awarded \$1,000 and third place receives \$750. In addition, 30 schools won "Judges Choice Awards" provided by sponsors and donors in the amount of \$250 - \$500 each for 'specialty' area including: habitat improvement, recycling, health and well-being, gardening, green fundraising, transportation, energy conservation, curriculum integration, water conservation, environmental education and solid waste reduction.

and Martin County public, private and charter schools in 2019. District X sponsored a Judge's Choice Award in the amount of \$250, which was presented by Sandra Lagana, the District Green Schools liaison to Palm Beach Day Academy for Habitat Improvement. Palm Beach Day Academy has created an "Eco-Garden" which contains xeriscape plants, a bird feeder, a bird bath and a rain barrel. Their outdoor classroom earned recognition as a National Wildlife Federation Certified Wildlife Habitat. They have done an exceptional job of creating and maintaining native habitats and connecting them into the school curriculum and activities.

DADE CITY PROCLAIMED A "MONARCH CITY USA"



On March 12, 2019, Camille S. Hernandez, Mayor of Dade City, Florida, on behalf of the entire Commission, proclaimed Dade City as a Monarch City USA. The City is joining with the Dade City Garden Club to increase public awareness; urging all residents of Dade City to do their part by planting and protecting native milkweed and Monarch nectar sources. This will insure that the Monarch has the resources necessary to produce successive generations and sustain their spectacular 3000 mile yearly migration to Mexico through our City and our State.

There was a time when the butterfly was easily recognized by young and old alike as these big orange-winged butterflies that were seen everywhere, from gardens and weedy lots to golf courses. The Monarch was probably the first butterfly we caught as kids! But today, we hardly ever see a Monarch flying around.

After some club research, we now know that in the last 20 years over a billion butterflies have vanished, over 90% of our Monarchs, according to data released by the US Fish and Wildlife Service. Monarchs rely on milkweed and nectar plants for their food and home. These plants, especially the native milkweed, have increasingly vanished from our countryside. The good news is that municipalities, community groups of all ages, and individual gardeners can help save the Monarchs with a few simple steps. We can work together right here in Dade City to restore habitat for Monarchs where we live, work, learn, play and worship. The City and the Garden Club envision Monarch habitats (waystations) at public parks, community gardens, schools, churches and municipal buildings.


With our designation of a Monarch City (only the 5th named city in Florida) the City has pledged to work with the Garden Club and the Pasco County Extension Service in Dade City to provide public education opportunities to participants; teaching them how to become official butterfly waystations providing habitats all over Dade City to encourage Monarchs to stop in to pollinate, lay eggs, produce caterpillars that will grow into more Monarch butterflies!

On March 16th, the Dade City Garden Club sponsored a successful seminar and plant sale. This is the first of events and festivals to come that will educate the public on how to create butterfly and other pollinator waystation habitats. Over 45 people gathered to hear our amazing speaker, Jim West, from Deland (the first Monarch City USA in Florida) and to see and learn about the plants they needed to create the perfect Monarch waystation right in their own backyard.

Jim West is a native Floridian and was raised in a family who owned a flower shop, nursery and landscape business. He developed a passion for gardening

and as a high-school special needs teacher brought this passion to his students, who would plant over 20 gardens on school campuses. With the designation of Deland as a Monarch City, Jim designed a 1,200 plant butterfly garden installed in Bill Dreggor's Park.

Jim discussed the Monarch butterflies life cycle, migration, and the drastic decline in their population. He listed the exclusive larval food (Milkweed) for Monarchs and also the



nectar food flowering plants they preferred. His enthusiasm was contagious and there was a lively Q&A session as everyone was amazed about the ease of creating a waystation in their yard. They were excited about experiencing the life cycle of these beautiful creatures so important to sustaining our food chain. Their voracious appetites lead to increased pollination of our fruits and vegetables.

Last Spring, what began as a discussion among garden club members has evolved into what we hope will be a *movement*. One that will bring together the young and the old, our families and businesses, churches and politicians – all working together to create a successful and spectacular Dade City "Monarch City USA".




FFGC President: Albert (Al) Latina

Wellington Garden Club's 5th Annual Tree Planting Peaceful Waters Sanctuary, Wellington, Florida

Wellington Garden Club members and volunteers planted approximately 500 native trees/shrubs along the pathways of Peaceful Waters Sanctuary in Wellington, Florida on a beautiful, sunny Saturday morning, September 22, 2018. Staff from the Village of Wellington's Landscape & Urban Forestry Operations pre-dug the holes which made it much easier for the volunteers to place the seedlings into the ground. The selected seedlings to plant at the preserve were (200) Simpson's Stopper Tree (*Myrcianthes frangrans*), (100) Myrsine (*Rapanea punctate*), (100) Elderberry (100) (*Sambucus canadensis*) and (100) Firebush (*Hamelia patens*). Each of these varieties can be grown as shrubs or as trees.

This was the Club's 5th Annual Tree Planting event. For the previous four years, native trees and shrubs including Florida Slash Pine, Mahogany and Cardinal shrubs were placed along the walkways and waterline at the Wellington Environmental Preserve. We try to coordinate this wonderful community-wide event on National Public Lands Day (NPLD), which celebrated 25 years of planting and growing resources around our nation. Resilience and restoration of our natural resources is the focus of the National Environmental Education Foundation which created NPLD Day. Wellington Garden Club is nationally registered each year on the National Public Lands Day website.


