**Azalea GC of Pace** held a Kids Day in the Park to celebrate National Gardening Week. There were four stations; Bugs, Birds, Bees and Butterflies. The children were taught how important each one is to our environment and had a hands on project at each station to take home. After completing all stations they were given an information booklet and a certificate of completion.

**Defuniak Springs GC** maintains the Library Garden, working in the summer there to keep it looking beautiful. Their Knock Out Roses are outstanding, They also hosted a Lake Festival.

**Dogwood GC of Crestview** graciously provided the breakfast bread at our Fall District Meeting. The homemade bread was tasty and enjoyed by all.

**Dogwood GC of Gulf Breeze** members have been busy presenting "Fun With Flowers", and floral design classes and will be hosting "Diggin' It" classes in 2019

**Garnier Beach GC's** theme this year is "Planting for Wildlife". They will be planting native plants for birds, bees, insects and all wildlife. Their hope is to have the three gardens they support certified by the National Wildlife Federation. They have also given out scholarships. **Garnier Beach** will host the Spring 2019 District Meeting.

**Green Thumb GC** has had programs on "Fun With Flowers" and a Floral Design Series (with 40 participants at first class). ### NGC ENVIRONMENTAL, GARDENING AND LANDSCAPE DESIGN SCHOOLS

The NGC Board approved the Landscape Design School's new curriculum at the Fall Board meeting. The curriculum will include a segment in each course explicitly aimed at redesigning a home landscape, including a three-hour class devoted to creating a personal plan. We will also focus on sustainability. Fundamentally, we need to be aware of the environmental burdens the typical suburban lawn and a few shrubs places on the national landscape. Even moderate changes in planting choices and cultural practices can make significant impacts on the ecosystems around us. This will be an exciting and dynamic approach to landscape design. Instructors will provide course outlines, and use of Stewards of the Land will be discontinued. Details about the transition dates (still to be determined) are forthcoming.

The final draft of the new combined Schools Handbook is nearing completion. However, it is important now and in the future to continue using **only** the interactive forms available on the NGC Schools website. The free Adobe Acrobat Reader software must be downloaded by the individual before downloading the interactive forms to your hard drive. Forms must be completed only on your hard drive and saved there before attaching and emailing to the appropriate person for signature. NO completed forms are to be sent (emailed) to Headquarters without the proper signatures at the bottom or without sending to all parties designated on each form. To assure timely and accurate processing, follow the instructions on all forms.

Now is the time of year for each Consultant to review the Good Standing Date for each School completed and if that date is 12/31/2018, the Consultant must refresh in 2018 or apply before 12/31/2018 for an extension. Remember that there is no requirement to test when refreshing. Also, for students taking tests in all three Schools, the new policy is Open Notes, Open Book.

Attention Environmental Consultants! Use your knowledge to advocate in the legislative process. One of the mission statements of NGC is:

"to review environmental problems and their possible solutions, to promote environmental literacy and to advocate sound environmental stewardship." — Keeping in Touch Nov. 2015.

Know the positions of your legislators. One of the main reasons to join a garden club, given by new members, is to become educated about local gardening practices. Also, our seasoned gardeners are challenged to **PLANTAMERICA!** NGC Gardening School provides current valuable information to meet those objectives.

#### NGC ENVIRONMENTAL SCHOOL

I love to talk about the NGC Environmental School. But, what exactly does this school entail? I'd like to go back to basics and explain how easy it is to become educated in Florida's unique environmental issues and how to become a NGC Environmental Consultant.

Environmental School (ES) was developed to teach the science behind many of today's environmental issues, most of which are quite complex. How people can make a significant effect in their homes and communities is stressed.

Each Environmental School is broken down into four different courses – an introduction to environmental studies, air, land, and water issues. Each course, for instance, water, is broken down into eight hours of class instruction and two hours of hands-on nature discovery field trips. Generally each course is taught over two days.

The full coursework adds up to 40 hours of instruction! Classes include ecology, sustainability, endangered plants & wildlife, ethics, agriculture, backyard wildlife habitat, just to name a few.

People just need to register for the course, pay the nominal fee, attend, and take the test to start becoming a NGC Environmental Consultant.

"Wait one minute", some of you are thinking, "did I correctly read the word, 'test'?" This is generally where people panic! But believe me, our tests are nothing to worry about. Our tests are open book, and subject matter is reviewed prior to any test taking.

At the end of all four courses, attendees are then designated as NGC Environmental Consultants. Consultants must then "refresh" or take continuing education credits to keep their good standing status.

Please watch for Environmental School courses in *The Florida Gardener*, the FFGC website, and under "Educational Opportunities" on www.DistrictX.org. If you spend time in other areas of the country, the National Garden Clubs website lists all courses offered throughout the country. The courses can be taken in any order, so if Course 3 is offered at a convenient date and place for you, you can start there.

#### NORTH FLORIDA: What to Plant in December

Annuals/Bedding plants: Masses of petunia, pansy, snapdragon, lobelia, alyssum, and viola add color in winter. Bulbs: Amaryllis can be forced to bloom now or planted outdoors for spring blooms. Herbs: Some CENTRAL FLORIDA What to Do in December examples of cool-weather herbs include parsley, thyme, sage, dill, fennel, garlic, comfrey, and cilantro. Vegetables: Reliable cool-season vegetables include cabbages, collards, beets, and broccoli.

#### NORTH FLORIDA: What to Do in December

Poinsettias: Enjoy one of the most popular indoor holiday plants. With proper care, this colorful plant gives weeks of color. Cold damage: Wait until warm weather returns to cut back cold-damaged plants. Vegetable garden: Make sure that seeds and transplants are properly spaced for good development of tubers and vegetables. Houseplants: Inspect regularly for pests on indoor plants. Keep in mind that adequate light is a key factor to ensuring that indoor plants thrive. Soil test: Consider performing a soil test if plants do not perform as desired or if new plantings are planned. Compost/mulch: Use fallen leaves to provide the carbon ingredient needed for successful composting and also to make a good mulch. Garden pests: Continue monitoring and treat as needed. While cooler weather generally means fewer pests, some populations actually increase at this time of year.

#### NORTH FLORIDA: What to Plant in January

Annuals/Bedding plants: Cool-season annuals include pansy, viola, petunia, and snapdragon. Bulbs: Crinum, agapanthus, and gloriosa lily can be planted now. Mulch to protect from cold temperatures. Camellias: Select and plant camellia this month. Visit local nurseries now for the best selection of colors and forms. Vegetables: Irish potatoes can be planted now. Start with healthy seed pieces purchased from a local nursery or online seed catalog. Continue planting coolseason crops, including broccoli, kale, carrots, and lettuce.

#### NORTH FLORIDA: What to Do in January

Deciduous fruit: Plant deciduous fruit trees now to give the roots time to develop before the warm, dry spring months. Prune and fertilize existing trees. Cold protection: Be ready to cover tender plants to minimize damage. Frost/freezes are likely this month and next. Irrigation: Water plants if temperatures are higher than normal and rainfall is scarce. Shrubs and trees: Prune non-spring flowering shrubs and trees this month to improve form. Consider a hurricane-resistant tree, such as live oak, bald cypress, cabbage palm, or crape myrtle. Crape myrtle: Remove seed pods. crossing branches and small twiggy growth to improve the appearance and form of the plant. Hard pruning is not required. Pests: Control persistent scale insects on citrus, shrubs, camellias, and deciduous fruit trees; apply horticultural oil while plants are dormant.

#### CENTRAL FLORIDA: What to Plant in December

Annuals/Bedding plants: Add color to the winter garden by planting masses of petunia, pansy, and snapdragon. Bulbs: Amaryllis can be forced to bloom now or planted outdoors for spring blooms. Herbs: Plant herbs that thrive in cool weather such as parsley. thyme, sage, dill, fennel, and cilantro. Vegetables: Cool-season vegetables to plant this month include celery, cauliflower, lettuce, cabbage, and carrot.

**Cold protection**: Prepare now to protect tender plants should cold weather threaten. Lawn disease: Continue to watch for brown patch and large patch, fungal diseases that cause areas of grass to turn brown. Since treatment is difficult, prevention with proper cultural practices is key. These diseases become active when the soil temperature, measured 2-4 in. deep. is between 65°F and 75°F and go dormant when the weather warms in May. Houseplants: Inspect regularly for pests on indoor plants. Keep in mind that plantspecific temperature, light, and humidity are key to ensuring that indoor plants thrive. Soil test: Consider performing a soil test if plants do not perform as desired or new plantings are planned. **Compost/mulch**: Use fallen leaves to provide the carbon ingredient needed for successful composting and also to make a good mulch. Landscape and garden pests: Continue monitoring and treat as needed. While cooler weather generally means fewer pests, some populations increase at this time of year.

#### **CENTRAL FLORIDA What to Plant in January**

Annuals/Bedding plants: Plants that can be added to the garden during the coolest months include dianthus, pansy, petunia, viola, and snapdragon. Bulbs: Crinum, agapanthus, and gloriosa lily bulbs can be planted now. Provide a layer of mulch to protect from cold temperatures. Camellias: Select and plant camellias this month. Visit local nurseries now for the best selection of colors and forms. Vegetables: Irish potatoes can be planted now. Start with healthy seed pieces purchased from a local nursery or online seed catalog. Continue planting cool-season crops, including kale, broccoli, carrots, and lettuce.

#### CENTRAL FLORIDA: What to Do in January

Deciduous fruit: Plant these fruit trees now to give their roots time to develop before the warm, dry spring months. Prune and fertilize existing trees. Cold protection: Prepare to cover tender plants to minimize damage and be sure covers extend all the way to the ground. Frost or freezes are likely this month and next. Irrigation: Irrigate lawns and landscape plants minimally as this is their dormant season. Shrubs and trees: Prune non-spring flowering shrubs and trees this month to improve form. Crape myrtle: Remove seed pods, crossing branches, and small twiggy growth to improve the appearance and form of the plant. Hard pruning is not required. Pests: Apply horticultural oil to citrus, shrubs, camellias, and deciduous fruit trees while plants are dormant to control scale.

Annuals/Bedding plants: To add color to the winter garden, plant masses of begonia, impatiens, and geranium. Bulbs: Amaryllis can be forced to bloom now or planted outdoors for spring blooms. Herbs: Plant herbs that thrive in cool weather; such as parsley, thyme. sage, dill, fennel, and cilantro. Vegetables: Cool season vegetables to plant this month include broccoli, carrots, kale, green onions, and others.

#### SOUTH FLORIDA: What to Do in December

Poinsettias: Enjoy one of the most popular holiday plants. Protect it from cold until spring, and then plant it in the garden for next year. Irrigation: Irrigate if the weather has been warm and dry. Monitor plants for signs of stress and water only as needed. Lawns: Continue monitoring for brown patch and large patch fungal disease until May. Proper cultural practices are key for control. Houseplants: Inspect regularly for pests on indoor plants. Keep in mind that plant-specific temperature, light, and humidity are key to ensuring that indoor plants thrive. Soil test: Consider performing a soil test if plants do not perform as desired or if new plantings are planned. Compost/mulch: Use fallen leaves and plant debris to provide the carbon ingredient needed for successful composting and also to make a good mulch. Landscape and garden pests: Continue monitoring and treat as needed. While cooler weather generally means fewer pests, some pest populations actually increase at this time of year. Holiday trees: Consider enjoying a live southern red cedar and then plant it in the landscape when the holidays are over. Protect: Protect tender orchid, impatiens, and tomatoes from falling temperatures.

#### SOUTH FLORIDA: What to Plant in January

Annuals/Bedding plants: Plants that can be added to the garden during the coolest months include begonia. browallia, lobelia, dianthus, dusty miller, and nicotina. Bulbs: Winter is a great time to plant bulbs that will bloom in the spring. Examples include Clivia lily, crinum, and agapanthus. Herbs: Many herbs thrive in cooler temperatures, including tarragon, thyme, dill, fennel, and any of the mints. Vegetables: Many vegetables can be planted this time of year. This the last month to plant Irish potatoes, beets, broccoli, Brussels sprouts, cabbage, cauliflower, collards, kale, mustard, and turnips.

#### **SOUTH FLORIDA: What to Do in January**

Landscape: It's a good time to plant woody shrubs. Water frequently to get new plantings off to a good start. Irrigation: Water plants if temperatures remain higher than normal and rainfall is scarce. Shrubs and trees: Prune non-spring flowering shrubs and trees this month to improve form. Crape myrtle: Remove seed pods, crossing branches, and small twiggy growth to improve appearance and form. Hard pruning is not required. Cold protection: Bring sensitive plants like orchids inside if a frost or freeze is predicted. Thoroughly water and cover sensitive plants in the landscape 12-24 hours before a freeze. Pests: Apply horticultural oil to citrus, shrubs, and deciduous fruit trees while plants are dormant to control scale. Apply copper

# Wellington Garden Club and District X Represented at Everglades Foundation Symposium

held on September 22nd. This year, the Everglades Foundation Symposium program included discussion not only on the need for Everglades restoration but also the need to have a comprehensive water policy that will protect all of Florida-including Florida's marine life.

Before the hurricane of

1928, most of the land south of Lake Okeechobee was marshland, with water naturally flowing south through the river of grass known as the Florida Everglades. But, after the tragic loss of life when Lake Okeechobee flooded, the decision was made to build a dike around the lake, and also to manage the water level within the lake through a series of canals where excess water was pumped east and west out of the lake to the rivers and eventually to the Gulf of Mexico and the Atlantic Ocean. Today, instead of having water from the lake naturally percolating south towards the Everglades, the water that is pumped east and west carries with it the pollutants from wastewater treatment areas and agricultural run-off, causing our estuaries and coastal ocean areas to be clogged with algae blooms and red tide which in turn provides toxic air and leaves our beaches and waterways littered with dead marine life.

What was both interesting and scary was the scientific data presented by Dr. Larry Bond from Florida International University. Dr. Bond presented the results of a study on the impact of toxic waters. The study examined what happens in the brains of dolphins who live and swim in the waters. Through autopsies on the dolphins, Dr. Bond found that their brains had an accumulation of a tangled protein—the same type of tangled protein found in ALS (Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis) patients.

This, compounded with data that shows increased hospitalizations for respiratory issues, COPD and asthma when algae blooms and red tide occur is why we need to respond to good Florida environmental policies and laws.

What should we do? In the short run we should alert the decision-makers and then protect ourselves the best we can. In the long run we should make it our goal to effect change. So there really is no time to sit back. Whether you want to participate with Everglades Restoration, contribute to Captains for Clean Water, get a Facebook page to speak out or react to our emailed garden club environmental alerts to call our State Congress representatives during legislation to vote for good environmental laws. Choose one or two of these initiatives and then stick with it because the health and life of Floridians depend on all of us doing what we can to make sure there will be clean water for our children and grandchildren.

# The 2018 Water Resources Development Act Becomes Federal Law!

The bill, referred to as WRDA, provides for a critical and fundamental Everglades Restoration and estuaries enhancement project that will enable excess water to be directed south out of Lake Okeechobee instead of east and west to the St. Lucie and Caloosahatchee Rivers and estuaries. The project is designed to move water from Lake Okeechobee through 6,500 acres of filtering marshes to clean the water and store it in a 10,500 acre reservoir. The reservoir is estimated to cost about \$1.6 billion, which will be split evenly between the federal government and the state of Florida

The bill also directs the U.S. Army Corp of engineers to implement a five year harmful algal bloom technology development program to identify and develop improved strategies for prevention an management techniques, early detection and procedures to reduce harmful algal blooms.

According to excerpt from an article published in *Treasure Coast Newspapers* on October 23, 2018, by Tyler Treadway and Ali Schmitz, "The preliminary design or the project from the water management district includes a 23-foot-deep, 10,100-acre reservoir to store up to 78.2 billion gallons of excess lake water and a 6,500-acre man-made marsh to clean the water before it's sent south to Everglades National Park and Florida Bay.

The project is expected, when used in conjunction with other existing and planned projects, to reduce the number of damaging discharges from Lake Okeechobee to the St. Lucie and Caloosahatchee rivers by 63 percent.

It also will send an average of about 120.6 billion gallons of clean water south to the thirsty Everglades and Florida Bay."

Florida's Senators Nelson and Rubio both worked to have this program included in the bill. President Donald Trump signed the federal Water Resources Development Act on October 23, 2018. WRDA includes a nationwide list of water projects that includes the reservoir south of Lake Okeechobee.

Our voices will be needed to continue the momentum to support project funding in the 2019 and 2020 federal budgets to keep the project moving, and at the state level we will need to pursue a commitment from the new administration to ensure the project is started.

#### **Internet Security Refresher**

Yes, we are all under cyber attack. "Phishing," hacking, spam, malware, viruses — are all bad actors. Everyone using a computer or smartphone is vulnerable, but there are some simple steps to avoid falling prey to surveillance, stolen data and frozen computers. The golden rule is to set strong passwords, update apps from reliable sources, have good anti-virus protection, and know which emails and files are suspicious (and get rid of them).

Account Passwords Create a new password for every account. It should contain at least 12 to 16 characters and contain a combination of numbers, symbols, uppercase letters, lowercase letters, and spaces. According to <a href="mailto:cnet.com">cnet.com</a>, "the password should be free of repetition, dictionary words, usernames, pronouns, IDs, and any other predefined number or letter sequences."

Public Wi-Fi They may be fine when you're in a hurry and checking the weather forecast, but don't use public Wi-Fi to make a credit card purchase or look at your bank account balance. Your passwords and pin information may be exposed on public hotspots. If you're staying in a hotel, check to see if the room Wi-Fi is private. It usually is public in the lobby.

Ransomware and Phishing Scams These are phony emails with links or attachments that look like they're from a business you know (bank, cable provider, or credit card company). Delete the email and report it to the company where you have your account. Do NOT click on links or attachments. Phishing scams are emails that request personal information to qualify for long-forgotten ancestor's estate, or when the name of a garden club friend shows up needing bail in Mexico, or emails asking to fund a "Go Fund Me" account. Do NOT click on anything that looks fishy or is out of the ordinary. Do NOT send money or buy cash cards to send to the email sender. Do NOT respond with your password and pin information. If you happen to click on a bad email or attachment and your computer freezes, disconnect your computer from the network immediately and contact a cybersecurity expert or online security firm and let them help you. Update your malware software!

Encryption Your privacy relies on your data being secure. The average citizen should usually only worry about tech companies tracking them to serve up ads pertinent to your browsing sites. Installing an ad blocker will stop pop-up ads. Check the security in the browser bar for the locked icon when making an online purchase. iPhones are seen as the most secure mainstream device today. Modern and newer Android devices usually come with strong security features, but there isn't a universal implementation of encryption yet. Your iPhone encrypts as soon as you lock your screen, but Android devices have to be shut down entirely.

Focus on prevention as much as on real time soft-ware protection against threats. Think before you click!

#### Protect yourself from Identity Theft

The Internet is not the only place where security breaches can occur. The following information from **USA.gov** has some useful tips regarding the most common types of schemes. Identity (ID) theft happens when someone steals your personal information to commit fraud.

The identity thief may use your information to fraudulently apply for credit, file false tax returns, or get medical services. These acts can damage your credit status, and cost you time and money to restore your good name. You may not know that you're the victim of ID theft immediately. You could be a victim if you receive:

Bills for items you didn't buy

- ⇒ Debt collection calls for accounts you didn't open
- ⇒ Denials for loan applications

Children and seniors are especially vulnerable to ID theft. Child ID theft may go undetected for many years. Victims may not know until they're adults, applying for their own loans. Seniors are vulnerable because they often share their personal information with doctors and caregivers. The number of people and offices that access their information put them at risk.

Types of ID Theft There are several common types of identity theft that can affect you: Tax ID theft - Someone uses your Social Security number to falsely file tax returns with the IRS or your state. Medical ID theft - Someone steals your Medicare ID or health insurance member number. Thieves use this information to get medical services or send fake bills to your health insurer. Social ID theft - Someone uses your name and photos to create a fake account on social media

Secure your internet connections, use security features, (like those described in the previous article by Phyllis White) and review bills.

Take steps to protect yourself from identity theft:

- Secure your Social Security number (SSN). Don't carry your Social Security card in your wallet. Only give out your SSN when absolutely necessary.
- Don't share personal information (birthdate, Social Security number, or bank account number) just because someone asks for it.
- Collect mail every day. Place a hold on your mail when you are away from home for several days.
- Pay attention to your billing cycles. If bills or financial statements are late, contact the sender.
- Use the security features on your mobile phone.
- Update sharing and firewall settings when you're on a public wi-fi network. Use a virtual private network, if you use public wi-fi.
- Review your credit card and bank account statements.
   Compare receipts with account statements. Watch for unauthorized transactions.
- Shred receipts, credit offers, account statements, and expired credit cards, to prevent "dumpster divers" from getting your personal information.
- Store personal information in a safe place.
- Install firewalls and virus-detection software on your home computer.
- Change your passwords if a company that you do business with has a breach
  of its databases.
- Review your credit reports once a year. Be certain that they don't include accounts that you have not opened. You can order it for free from Annualcreditreport.com.
- If you think you have bills or charges that do not belong to you, freeze your credit files with Equifax, Experian, Innovis, TransUnion, and the National Consumer Telecommunications and Utilities Exchange, for free. Credit freezes prevent someone from applying for and getting approval for credit account or utility services in your name.

An engraved plaque with all winners dating back to 1988 remains on display at the State Department of Transportation headquarters in Tallahassee.

Winners will be selected by a panel of judges selected by the FFGC. Judges will rely exclusively on the documentation provided by each nominee. Judges will look for evidence of: Preservation, conservation and maintenance of Florida native plants and/or wildflowers growing on highway rights-of-way. Roadside management that promotes flowering, and natural regeneration and dispersal of established Florida native seeds and plants. Preparation and planting of Florida native seeds and plants. Management of Florida native plants and habitats within the rights-of-way. Efficient use of available resources.

**INSTRUCTIONS FOR ROADSIDE MAINTENANCE UNITS:** Submit documentation on or before January 31. Documentation provided by nominee may be up to three 8 ½" x 11" pages. On page one, provide the following information: Date of submission, Roadside Maintenance Unit (name as it should appear on any award received), unit supervisor, phone, address, and email contact information. Provide the location or locations where the unit has improved, enhanced, and added visual quality and beauty to Florida transportation corridors. Include the road name and/or number noting the start and end of improved or enhanced area, and any nearby defining landmarks. Include small location map with area identified. Arrange the remaining pages as best to include the following:

Photographs (especially during blooming season) with captions describing the improved or enhanced area. Nominees are encouraged to include before, during, and after-action photographs of workers and others involved in the project. Photographs of the roadside at its peak beauty are helpful.

A written narrative of the Unit's goals and accomplishments with a description of their work and activities related to planting and management of Florida native wildflowers and/or native plants along the roadside. Include description of anticipated future activities at this location.

#### Sunset Park Garden Club Celebrates 90 years!

Ninety years counting and celebrating we are at the Sunset Park Garden Club! And as we do such, we reflect on our predecessors and our proud history. It all began in the year 1928. Sunset Park, a residential community was being developed. Charles Glover, one of the developers was married to Alma and their home was one of the new residences. On June 5, 1928 a group of ladies met at this home to form the Sunset Circle of Tampa Federation of Garden Club Circles. At that meeting over 90 years back, what is now called the "Sunset Park Garden Club" emerged.

In that inaugural year the ladies busied themselves landscaping the shores of Lake Kipling and the parkways of the neighborhood. The year 1931 opened with the club withdrawing from the Tampa Federation and the name officially changed to "Sunset Park Garden Club." The early 30's were spent planting the oak trees lining Westshore to Gandy, of which most still stand today, creating a lovely canopy. The club was instrumental in getting Tampa Electric Co. to run power poles to Sunset Beach so lights would be available for the many picnics, family suppers and fundraisers that were to come. Around 1934 a gazebo was erected in the park and later evening dances with an orchestra occurred!

In 1935 the club received a deed from McDonald Construction Co. for the old Water Works building at 4624 Browning Ave. The City of Tampa was taking over the water mains and the old pump house would no longer be needed. The hull of the old building was repaired and rebuilt and that fall the club was formally opened with a reception.

Throughout the years, the ladies of the club sponsored charities, set up a lending library, erected street markers, delivered Christmas baskets to the needy, planted trees at Mabry and Roosevelt Schools and continued landscaping the parkways and triangles of the neighborhood. The year 1936/37 was marked with the first "style show," assisted by Mr. Ernest Maas of the historical "Maas Brothers," a Tampa cornerstone fashion department store!

During the 40's our club joined the war effort by raising funds for the Red Cross and sewing over a thousand "kits" and over four thousand "housewives." In the 50's the club began focusing on flower arranging, flower show, corsage-making and horticulture. Fundraising to beautify and maintain the club included selling



food at elections, dessert card parties, cookbook sales and building rentals. Through these funds and donations, a clubhouse room addition was completed and the  $30^{\rm th}$  anniversary saw the dedication of this new structure in 1959. Today, our members continue our traditions with educational programs, field trips

and lunch at each meeting, as well as an annual Card Party and Flower Show each spring. Keeping up our Tampa treasure clubhouse is of the utmost importance and 2018 saw the completion of a new roof, donated by Quality Roofing of Tampa!

Our history of hospitality and graciousness continues as well. Therefore, we invite you to visit us at our clubhouse and step back in time as you explore the old pump house and history that lines the walls.


