


Are you planting trees and shrubs for beauty, color, for their air conditioning and noise abatement qualities and for awards? Have you noticed that native plants require less water?

#### short course

Off to another beautiful University town — Gainesville — in

June. This Short Course featured two very different types of Flower Arrangers... Lucille Davis creating an unbelievable number of exquisite Japanese Arrangements illustrating the history of Ikebana and Mrs. John Higgins showing a variety of exciting creative designs—some using collage backgrounds and others utilizing Kinetic or moving areas in the design.

As National Council is sponsoring a Bicentennial Collage Contest, Mrs. Higgins' program on Collage was particularly timely. First of all we found that the singular and plural forms of the word "collage" are the same. A bad mark for the May/June issue of *The Gardener* that reported the lecture title as "collages"!

Collage is a type of Assemblage — anything goes in the way of material, as long as it can be attached to the background in some way.

Collage is a great art form for the amateur. The approach to a theme is very casual — the conscious mind plays a secondary role.

Collage should be psychologically surprising and always fanciful. Accidental relationships are the basis for design, arranged until a satisfying effect is realized. Basic design principles are always to be incorporated and through the unorthodox use of materials take on new excitement.

A trip to the Florida State Museum was a real highlight. If you haven't visited the Cave, you'd better put it in your future plans. The museum is small but exquisite . . . a real gem.

## S.E.E.K. '74 Youth Conference

Dr. Marty Wanielista, director of the Youth Environmental Conference, produced a magnificent three day program for 143 young people and adults attending "S.E.E.K. '74" at Florida Tech. University in August.

Participants were sent with all expenses except transportation paid for, thanks to *involved* Florida Federation members and two S.E.E.K. sponsors, Shell Oil Company and the Robert O. Law Foundation.

Lectures on every aspect of the energy crisis were presented by outstanding speakers representing business, government and conservation agencies.

The College Faculty conducted sessions where our high school and intermediate gardeners and their unit directors received first-hand experience with Solar Cookers, Lazer Beams, Fresnel Lens Furnaces and Wind Machines — all alternate sources of power.

Nuclear Energy and Radiation Control, Ecology and Energy and Future Energy Resources were but a few of the many areas explored.

Speaking to the conference were Mrs. Howard Kittel, President

of National Council of State Garden Clubs and Mrs. Vernon Conner, Florida's 1st Vice President of National Council.

Miss Elizabeth Mason, National Environmental Conference Chairman presided at one meeting and Mrs. John Cherry, President of the Garden Club of Georgia and three delegates from Georgia attended as guests of Florida.

But it wasn't all work and no play . . . no dull boys here! Or girls either. A pool party and meals together led to new friendships and a little diversion from the serious business at hand.

Mrs. Gordon M. Rainey, Jr., President of Ortega Forest Garden Circle of the Garden Club of Jacksonville presented a check for \$500 to the Jacksonville Zoological Society for use in expansion and beautification of the Children's Zoo.

The thirty active garden club members selected the Children's Zoo as recipient of their Beautification project because it enabled them to accomplish two goals at the same time. Not only did their contribution provide greenery and beauty to the Zoo but will help the children of Jacksonville come to know a variety of animals as well.

Expansion of the Children's Zoo allows more room for a larger selection of "touchable" animals the children can love up close. It also enables the zoo to include a larger variety of exotic animals for viewing.

Ortega Forest Garden Circle's generous contribution is a substantial start toward bringing children and animals together in attractive surroundings.

#### **DISTRICT IV**

Mrs. John Helmuth, HANDS chairman, Orange Park Garden Club, accepted the W. Clyde Greenway Award of Excellence trophy and a check for \$500 for community improvement work under the Home and Neighborhood Development Sponsors (HANDS), at the 17th Annual Workshop held in Chattanooga, Tennessee on May 7, 8 and 9th.

Galvanized into action by the prospect of becoming inundated by rapid, unplanned growth and development of their town, the Garden Clubs of Orange Park rebutted, "It's not too late!" to the statement that "The town has been taken over by people who care nothing about it except profit and it's too late to do anything about it."

Realizing their main source of help would come from the city commission, they became a part of it. Not satisfied with promoting the passage of a tree ordinance and sign ordinance by the commission, garden clubs were responsible for the creation of an Environmental Quality Board with three garden club members on it. The Civic Beautification Committee, a brainchild of the garden clubs, was reactivated. This afforded the opportunity of working with other women representing many organizations, thereby involving them, also.

Of ten clubs and circles with a total membership of 233, 147 members actively worked on the following principal HANDS projects: 1—Having the city commission reactivate the Civic Beautification Committee. Four of the HANDS committee members are on this Board, as well as representatives of all other civic groups. 2—Planting the medians on one of the main

roads in town. 3—Breakfast for city officials, business people and realtors. "Beauty Builds Business" was the theme, but special emphasis was placed on city ordinances, etc. 4—Litter barrels painted with one design were placed throughout the town. 5—Preparation of slide presentation "It's Not Too Late". 6—High School Conservation Club. Creation of an environmental complex, complete with a natural pond—out of barren land.

Seed money of \$250 realized \$637 from the Garden Club, \$1000 from other civic organizations and hundreds of dollars in labor and time from dedicated citizens.

Orange Park Garden Club members have made their citizens AWARE and they are taking ACTION by becoming INVOLVED.

MR. JESSE T. BARFIELD: retired Registrar of Pensacola Junior College, will instruct on Camellias. #### **RULES FOR DIVISION III – YOUTH GARDENERS**

- 1 In every respect this show will comply with the objectives and requirements for a Standard Flower Show, as established by National Council of State Garden Clubs. The Handbook for Flower Shows, 1970 Edition, shall be used as authority. Judges decisions are final.
- 2 Classes are open to students in registered units of Junior (grades 1 through 6), Intermediate (grades 7 through 9) and High School (grades 10 through 12) gardeners, affiliated with Florida Federation of Garden Clubs, Inc.

3 - Each exhibitor allowed one entry in a class.

4 — ADVANCE REGISTRATION IS REQUIRED. A COLOR CARD WILL BE SENT TO CONFIRM ALL REGISTRATIONS. BRING THIS CARD WITH EXHIBIT. IT MUST BE SUBMITTED TO THE CLASSIFICATION CHAIRMAN BEFORE THE EXHIBITOR LEAVES THE AREA.

DEADLINES: MARCH 31st — Horticulture — APRIL 4th — Artistic and educational.

- 5 All exhibits must be passed by the classification chairmen at the entry desk. These chairmen have authority to disqualify any entry not conforming to the schedule, or of inferior quality. CONSULTANTS ARE ALSO REGISTRATION CHAIRMEN.
- 6 Each entry must have EXHIBITOR'S NAME GRADE GARDEN CLUB (if any) DISTRICT NUMBER SCHOOL AND CITY.
- 7 Exhibits in all classes shall be exhibitor's own work, but may be placed, with the exhibitor's permission, by another person. The exhibitor is responsible for keeping his design fresh throughout the show. If unable to exhibit on date of show, exhibitor must provide a substitute.
- 8 Materials used in artistic design entries must be listed on an unlined white card. A brief interpretation may be included.

9 — Accessories, bases, and/or backgrounds (furnished by exhibitor) may be used in all artistic classes. No tinting or glitter allowed on fresh and/or dried flowers or foliage. No artificial flowers, leaves, or feathers permitted in the show. Flowers contrived of fresh plant material will be permitted.

10 - Potted plants must have been grown by exhibitor at least three months, and must be labeled with correct botanical name. Cut garden flowers must have been

grown by exhibitor at least one month.

11 — All horticulture classes may be divided and subdivided by variety and color. Sub-sections of artistic classes will be created ONLY by advance registration. Each sub-section must consist of at least four entries.

The Fort Lauderdale Research Center lists, in addition to the Coconut Palm: Veitchia, Pritchardia, Arikuryroba, Corypha, Trachycarpus and two varieties of Phoenix in which the mycoplasma that causes lethal yellowing has been identified.

Until such time as we are sure just how the lethal yellowing virus is spread, each one of you should leave the palms where they are!!!

Fairchild Tropical Gardens will omit palms from their plant distribution; the Palm society is no longer mailing palm seed. Let's have no palms in plant sales and no corsages of palm roses.

Researchers are looking for a cure but in the meantime, don't spread it!!


